

Egyptian Forces In Gaza Surrender To The Israeli

TEL AVIV (Reuters)—Egyptian forces in the Biblical city of Gaza, a constant threat to modern Israel—surrendered Friday for Israel's biggest prize in the five-day war.

An Israeli Army spokesman said Friday night the whole of the Sinai Peninsula and the Gaza strip were under Israeli control despite isolated fighting in some sectors.

In London, Israeli ambassador Eilahu Elath said the fall of

Gaza signified that Israel had "practically concluded" its current military operations against Egypt.

"Our vital interest on self-defence required that action," he told a press conference. "For eight years we have been living in a continual state of terror and attacks."

CROWDED WITH REFUGEES
Egyptian forces seized Gaza, ancient city of the Philistines, on the day that Israel proclaimed herself a nation in 1948 at the end of the British mandate. The city is at the centre of a coastal strip, 25 miles long and crowded with 321,000 people, mostly Arab refugees.

An Israeli announcement also claimed the conquest at dawn of El Arish at the approaches of the Gaza strip about 90 miles east of the Suez Canal.

(The British-operated Cyprus radio announced the bulk of the Egyptian forces have withdrawn from the Sinai Peninsula to await a British-French invasion.)

In Paris, the Israeli Embassy said Israel has taken about 15,000 Egyptian prisoners in the Sinai Peninsula and captured about 100 tanks with other weapons.

An Israeli Army communique said a large number of Egyptian fedayeen (commando) units attacked central points in the Negev, blowing up a number of vehicles and irrigation pipes. All other borders were reported quiet.

"DAY OF SURRENDERS"
Col. Moish Pearlman, Israeli Army spokesman, called Friday the Egyptians' "day of surrenders."

Egyptian Maj.-Gen. Mohammed Saad El Badawy surrendered unconditionally at Gaza, where in Biblical days the strong man Samson pulled down the temple of the Philistines and died.

Pearlman said Israel's forces now extend in the west to about 12 miles from the canal.

He said Israeli forces were not intending to cross the canal, although there had been no agreement with the Anglo-French forces on the matter.

Asked whether Israel intends to hold what she now has, Pearlman said the state wants to hold such areas "until we can have normal relations with our neighbors and ensure freedom of shipping to Israel in the Suez Canal and the Gulf of Aqaba."

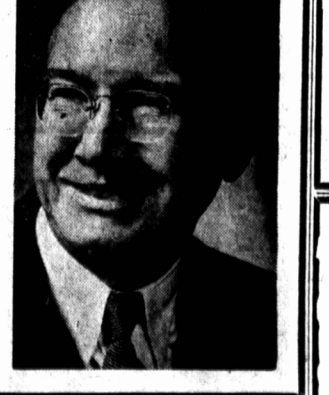
