Restlessness Spirit Is Sweeping Portugal

By GEORGE ARFELD LISBON (AP)—The unrest rippling through Lisbon University and filtering down to high school circles appears symptomatic of a wide-spread desire to make some changes in Portuguese life.

Four student street demonstrations here this winter ended in violence when riot police clashed with the youngsters. The immediate reason behind the demonstrations was the arrest of at least 60 students. Political police accused them of belonging to outlawed Communist groups.

Perched on the southwestern end of Europe, Portugal was for long isolated from the rest of the continent. New tourism booms, jetliners rush in the latest European and American publications and television brings glimpses of life beyond Portugal's borders.

After 33 years in power, Premier Antonio Oliveira Salazar, 75, seems determined to stick to the same principles that brought him to near-absolute rule. Youth, fired up by the left-wing idealism so common on Latin campuses seems determined to crack some walls of Portuguese authority.

The government's handling of the student problem has brought criticism from right and left.

wing circles. These take on added importance since Portugal will elect a president and National Assembly deputies this year. Anti-government demonstrations are expected frequently sometimes with a view of getting attention in the foreign press.

In broad terms today's Portuguese university student is the last of three generations during the Salazar years: Pre-war-time and post-war. They remain unimpressed when told how Salazar brought stability to Portugal by shaking scores of coups and revolutions. The outlawed Communists take advantage of this, but student leaders claim to be keeping an eye on them.

GROUP IS ORGANIZED "How can you avoid having them when they're the only anti-government group that is organized?" A law student asked.

The Student Associations have denied the scores of arrested persons are Communist-subversives. They point out they include the sons and daughters of prominent liberal journalists and doctors and even the vice-president of the militant Catholic University Youth.

Government leaders have spoken in favor of more intense political education to counter campus tendencies. They refuse to hear out or give in to student grievances.

A government source has said the political police estimate that "perhaps as much as half of the Lisbon University student body is infected by Communism."

struction activity at the Mica project, 92 miles north of Rev. elstone, to a minimum. A contract will be awarded this year for two 45-foot diversion tunnels. The tunnels will permit construction of 640-foot-high Mica dam to begin on a dry section of riverbed.

Hydro hopes to have about 100 miles of shoreline along the arrow lakes cleared before the end of 1965. Tenders for this work are expected to be called soon.

CLEARING TO BEGIN Crews will be in the field this spring to begin marking the flood line as a guide to clearing contractors. Actual clearing operations will begin in the summer and a total area of 30,000 acres will be cleared.

All economically merchantable timber will be salvaged before flooding behind the arrow dam begins in 1969.

The new call for quoted prices on the High Arrow Dam is based on a negotiated contract proposal which sets target costs at \$55,000,000.

"There are heavy penalties under the Columbia Treaty if this dam is not completed by

April, 1969," a hydro spokesman said. "In the original tender call the responsibility for meeting that date was shifted to the contractors. The bidders naturally wanted to protect themselves, so they added large sums to the tenders to cover that risk."

Britain, France Set To Proceed With Concorde PARIS (AP)—Construction of the supersonic transport plane Concorde by France and Britain will go ahead according to the original agreement signed in 1962, Information Minister Alain Peyrefitte said here.

Peyrefitte reported on a communication given to the weekly French cabinet meeting by Marc Jacquet, minister of public works and transport.

In addition, Peyrefitte said, an expanded co-operation program between the French and British aviation industries was being worked out to include an aerial bus which would transport 300 to 300 passengers over short ranges, as well as for military planes.
