Charlottetown and Queens County
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Merit Rating Is Topic Of Teachers Institute

More than 100 members of the Charlottetown Teachers' Institute met in workshop at Queen Charlotte High School on Wednesday evening. The assembly was addressed briefly by the president, Mrs. Alex MacIsaac, who then introduced the members of the evening's panel: F.W. Curtis, chairman; Dr. Frank MacKinnon, C.M. McLean, Bruce Hodgins and C. R. McQuaid.

The subject under discussion by the panel was "Merit Rating of Teachers", a topic arousing considerable public interest.

The speakers were in accord that some type of recognition for better teachers is desirable, and it was their considered opinion that such a plan, if a practical one could be achieved, should come from within the ranks of the teachers themselves, thereby placing the teaching profession on the level it merits and bringing it in line with the same policies in other professions.

Following the panel's discussion, members of the institute met in groups to discuss pertinent questions on the topic, after which group leaders reported their findings and opinions to the re-assembled institute.

The teachers expressed opinions agreed with those of the panel almost entirely. Specific emphasis, however, was placed on the importance of guidance counselling and selection of candidates both before and during teacher training.

The workshop was under the direction of Raja Gopal, chairman of that committee.

Lunch was served at the conclusion of the meeting by the social committee, under the chairmanship of Miss Greta Hansen.

Commission Confirms Water Shortage View

Water Commissioners Sidney E. Green and Joseph McKenna agreed yesterday that facilities for firefighting in the eastern section of Charlottetown are inadequate, but said any action to be taken on the matter will have to wait until after the civic election of Feb. 24.

Deputy Fire Chief Gordon Stewart scored the inadequacy of fire protection on Grand Street East, site of numerous oil storage facilities, during the annual meeting of the Charlottetown Fire Department earlier this week.

HELD MEETING

Following the newspaper report of Mr. Stewart's statements the two commissioners, and Frank Vanderstee, secretary of the water commission, held a meeting Thursday afternoon, at which Mr. Green and Mr. McKenna said they were pleased that the situation, as it exists, has been brought to the attention of the public so forcefully.

For the past several weeks, both commissioners have been aware of this serious situation regarding water supply shortage. At present, they are engaged in a study of the report of the survey, conducted last year by Pitometer Associates of New York City, in which this subject was one that the company has made recommendation to eliminate. The survey also showed the area as having an inadequate water supply for firefighting.

But owing to the extensiveness of the report, covering not only the east end of the city, but various other sections and services, a large amount of money will be required to implement any recommendations.

With this point in mind, and the fact that a civic election is close at hand, Mr. Green and Mr. McKenna, both stated that the present commission should not make any proposals or attempt to start any concrete action now.

They feel that anything that is to be done should be left to the new commission, and that they should not be placed in the situation of trying to carry out somebody else's plans and promises.

Both Mr. Green and Mr. McKenna have stated that they will re-nominate for water commissioner at the forthcoming civic election. If re-elected to office, they will, along with whoever becomes the third member of the commission, then determine what steps should be done to implement the recommendations contained in the Pitometer report.

John B. Roper Laid To Rest

The death occurred in the Prince Edward Island Hospital recently of John B. Roper in his 88th year. Mr. Roper was the oldest son of the late James McDonald Roper and Catherine MacCallum.

Mr. Roper spent all his lifetime in Charlottetown. In 1902 he became associated with his brother James in the breeding and raising of registered Guernsey cattle, and being a very prominent farmer and interested in livestock, he was called upon many times to be a livestock judge at exhibitions throughout the province.

In 1910 he became interested in the breeding and raising of silver foxes, and was known as one of the early breeders of silver foxes. He was, for a number of years, one of the senior inspectors for the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders Association.

The late Mr. Roper was married to Madie Ann Harper, who predeceased him in 1932. Of the marriage there are four sons, namely, Percy of North River, Arthur, Fred and Gordon all of Sherwood, also six grandchildren. He is survived by one sister, Emma, Mrs. Reuben McDonald, Toronto, and two brothers, Frank of Chilliwack, B.C.,
