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Bruce Hodgins Addresses City's B and P Women's Club

Miss Madelyn Clarka presided over the February meeting of the Charlottetown Business and Professional Women's Club held at the Charlottetown Hotel, February 12th. Tables decorated with flags of many nations provided an appropriate setting for the international theme of the meeting.

The guest speaker, Mr. Bruce Hodgins, introduced by the chairman of the Program Committee, Mrs. Ruth Osborne, gave a forceful and informative address on the Crisis in the United Nations. This crisis, as Mr. Hodgins sees it, is not the issues we hear most about, such as the strife in the Congo or the financial difficulties of the organization, but rather the dissatisfaction that has grown among Western leaders in the past year with the developments in the United Nations. Quoting criticisms by Sir Harold MacMillan, British Foreign Secretary Lord Home, and United States representative Mr. Adlai Stevenson.

He explained very clearly how the change in attitude came about. He explained the alignment of power in the fifty-one nations which originally joined the U.N., the transfer of important matters of policy to debate in the Assembly because of the Russian use of the veto in the Security Council, and a decrease of the influence of the West with the admission of many new independent nations of Africa and Asia. This he feels is a situation that the United States and Great Britain must accept since they cannot change it, and they should strive to preserve the U.N. rather than undermine it.
