WHEN NAPOLEON WAS A BOY.

It is often said that the boy is father of the man, and it is undoubtedly the case that in the character of a boy is often revealed a glimpse of what his manhood will be like.

Napoleon in after life was fond of talking about the days of his boyhood. Some who remembered those days have written that there was nothing extraordinary in him as a boy; as one writer says, "he had good health, and was in other respects like other boys." Another eye-witness tells us he was always proud and overbearing.

According to the statement of a friend of the Bonaparte family, Napoleon was not by any means a pretty child, but his expression was unusually kind and gentle, and he had a very sweet smile. This friend admits that he was self-willed, and when offended displayed frightful fits of anger. He was never afraid of punishment and could not brook opposition or interference.

The nurse to whose care the little Napoleon was committed, says that when reprimanded for any fault he never cried, and when he received a beating—and in Corsica they took the saying that sparing the rod spoils the child, literally—he bore it with an air of quiet defiance, always refusing to beg pardon.

The following story, it is said, is one that he related himself.—He was one day accused of having eaten without permission a basket of grapes, figs and citrons, which had been brought for his uncle the canon. None but those who were acquainted with the Bonaparte family can form any idea of the enormity of this offence. To eat fruit belonging to the canon his uncle was infinitely more criminal than to eat grapes and figs which might be claimed by anyone else. The missing fruit was inquired after, with the result that the young Napoleon was condemned as the guilty party. He denied it, and was severely whipped, all the time refusing either to confess or to ask for pardon. The result was that he was shut up alone and fed on bread and a piece of coarse cheese three whole days. But every application to the boy to confess and beg pardon was by a frown and a shake of the head. His sister Marianne and a little friend who was her playmate were the real culprits, and this was suspected by Napoleon, but to shield them from punishment he said nothing. He was then seven years old.

One who was familiar with the boy when he first came to Paris describes him astonished by what he saw, "gaping at the crowds turning his eyes now here, now there, with such a spirit of wandering investigation in them that his appearance suggested at once the newly imported countryman, one of those subjects a pickpocket would choose for a victim."

When he was at school he was not a favorite among his fellows, who thought him proud and morose, and with a great deal more vanity than they considered suited to his circumstances.

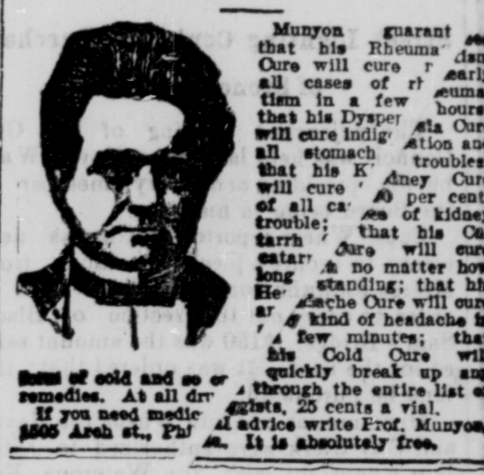

AN ANARCHIST ASSASSIN.

A Russian General Dies From a Pin Prick.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—General Panteleff, second in command of the Imperial Gendarmerie of Russia, met death under extraordinary circumstances two weeks ago, while travelling from St. Petersburg towards the German frontier, says a cablegram to the "Journal and Avenir," from Berlin. He and a prepossessing young stranger were seated opposite each other in a railway carriage, his companions being the Prince and Princess Apalinoff. All four engaged in conversation. The stranger rose from his seat, and in some way pricked the General's wrist in such a manner as to call forth an exclamation from him. The stranger was profuse in his apologies, and ascribed the prick to his scarf pin, which he had stuck on his sleeve after using it to cut the pages of a book. At the next stop of the train he alighted and disappeared. An hour later the General, it was discovered, was dead. At the autopsy the doctor discovered traces of a very violent poison, evidently communicated by means of the pin or needle. Several arrests have been made in connection with the crime, which is ascribed to the anarchist movement in Russia.
