Canadian Club To Hear Writer, Commentator

A voice that became known to millions of Canadians during the Second World War will be heard once again in Charlottetown Monday night when William Woodside speaks to members of the Prince Edward Island Canadian Club.

The meeting is scheduled to get underway at 6:30 at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Mr. Woodside's voice and name were familiar to Canadians the length and breadth of the nation from 1940 to 1945 through his nightly broadcasts for the CBC on the war situation in Europe.

Rated as a specialist in German affairs, Mr. Woodside is credited with being probably the first Canadian to recognize the importance of the Atlantic alliance. His observations were made in writings prior to the end of the war.

Although best known for his interest in foreign affairs, Mr. Woodside has also written a book concerning Canadian universities (The University Question: Who Should We Pay?) and a book on the subject of "Should We Pay?" and contested a federal election.

Mr. Woodside is vitally interested in the United Nations and has followed the development of the organization from its inception in San Francisco. He has attended most of the sessions of the Assembly since then. In 1958 he was appointed national director of the United Nations Association of Canada.

Although born in Portage la Prairie, Man., he was raised in Saskatchewan and Calgary and attended Toronto University.

Sporadic action followed which the union failed to follow up, and the matter died at that stage.
