Observatories Reorganized and Named

 OTTAWA (CP)—The federal agency responsible for research in the fields of astronomy, astrophysics, seismology and related sciences has been reorganized and renamed as a result of a vast expansion of its work in recent years.
 The Dominion observatories, the positions of Dominion astronomer and Dominion astrophysicist, will be retained. Under the new arrangement, both of these officials will be responsible to Dr. Hodgson as director of the observatories branch.
 Dr. Hodgson joined the observatory in 1949. Since then he has specialized in research of two types—the study of the nature of the earth's crust, the Canadian shield and the mechanism of earthquakes, a subject on which he is recognized as a world authority.
 Recently he was elected president of the UNESCO intergovernmental meetings on seismology and physics of the earth's interior.
 Dr. Petrie joined the observatory in 1952 and has since been in service with the Royal Canadian Navy during the Second World War. His research has been in astrophysical studies. As Dominion astronomer, he will be responsible for the operation of the observatories at Victoria and Penitencio and will be in charge of a proposed new 600,000 telescope likely to be built in southern Alberta or British Columbia.

Russia Reported Making Bid For Early Supersonic Liner

 MOSCOW (AP)—The head of the Soviet airline Aeroflot has announced Soviet designers are working on a supersonic liner and he indicated they hope to have one flying before the United States.
 Yevgeny F. Logvinov told a press conference here it was difficult to say who will be first, but added: "Apparently we will not be late."
 The Joint British-French supersonic airliner Concorde is expected to go into service before a Dominion Day visitor at the Moscow airport.
 One of the Soviet Union's most important flights faster than sound.
 Logvinov noted that the British-French plane will fly about 42 times the speed of sound and American studies are for a plane flying three times the speed of sound.
 It is difficult to say how fast the Soviet plane will be, but it will be faster than the British-French one, he said.

Farm Loans Ceiling Set For Hoisting
 OTTAWA (CP)—A bill doubling the amount industrial farmers may borrow under the Farm Improvement Loans Act will be introduced in the Commons, it was announced Saturday.
 Finance Minister Gordon filed a resolution for Monday's Commons order paper proposing to increase the limit to \$15,000 from \$7,500.
 The bill will also raise to \$500,000 the present \$400,000 limit on the aggregate amount of guaranteed farm improvement loans that may be outstanding during the current three years term of the act, which ends next June 30.
 A new three year loan period ending June 30, 1968, was proposed with \$700,000 limit on the aggregate that may be loaned and guaranteed by the government during that period.

Harbor Job Awarded
 OTTAWA (CP) — A \$12,500 contract for improvements to the harbor at Inverness, N.S., has been awarded to the McManis Construction Co. of Nova Scotia Limited, the public works department said today.
