Souris Council Plans New Year's Reception

SOURIS—Residents of Souris will be able to greet their Mayor and councillors' New Year's Day at the town's first levee.

The mayor and councillors decided at the regular council meeting last night to break from the custom of other years of not holding a New Year's reception.

With the season's first snowfall already here, council decided to publish notice of the town bylaw prohibiting parking on the town streets from midnight until 8 a.m. The notice will appear within the next few days. The bylaw will be "strictly enforced."

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Hockey Dispute Comes To End

SEPT-ILES, Que. (CP)—The hockey dispute, virtually a strike by the three teams of the eastern division of the North Shore Hockey League, has come to an end—at least an armed truce.

The dispute started more than a week ago when the league and team heads asked for a greater share of the gate, claiming that otherwise they would have quit playing in the arena, operated by the city.

Up to then the league received 50 per cent of the gate for the remainder went to the city. Sunday games draw about 1,500 and week-night games about 800.

No agreement was reached and the teams quit playing. City council Monday offered the league 45 per cent of the full gate, the city to get 55 per cent. The teams said no. They said it cost \$10,000 a year to operate each of the three teams. The league subsequently countered with an offer to pay the city \$150 a game for the remaining 53 games scheduled this season plus amounts to cover expenses such as dressrooms, practices and wages of ticket sellers, for a total amount of \$9,651.

Mayor B.H. Yeo and members of the Montague Town Council met recently to discuss matters pertaining to the location of a road to be built to the frosted food plant location. This road will have to cross the stream known as Barent Creek. It is expected that a dam will be built for water supply for the frozen food plant and following a discussion on the pros and cons the town officials felt that an extension of "Dump" or Central Street would be the most suitable for all. They are studying a map of the location of the stream and where the Fraser Valley Frosted Foods plant will locate. Preliminary work will get underway immediately with the plant to be ready for business in August 1963.

Mr. McQuaid who lost out to Liberal Daniel MacDonald, Bothwell, by 49 votes, according to unofficial returns, was named Attorney-General when the Shaw government was formed in mid-September, 1959. But the Premier suggested to this paper Tuesday that the treasurer's job was big enough for any extra duties.

The Souris lawyer holds the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Laws. He attended St. Dunstan's, St. Francis Xavier, and Dalhousie Universities.
