

SIR CHARLES TUPPER
On the Development of Canada.
Benefits of the Colonial Exhibition.

SIR CHARLES TUPPER will return to London on the 14th of this month, completely successful in his efforts to induce the Dominion Government, the Provincial Governments and the exhibitors to maintain a permanent exhibition of the products of Canada in the metropolis of the world.

A few days ago Sir Charles addressed a large meeting of exhibitors at Montreal, concluding as follows:—
“You will think it perhaps presumption in me to tell you that, from the signs of the times, I believe Canada at this moment is entering upon a career of progress and prosperity of which she has never dreamed.

The Vice-Admiralty Court.

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Advices from the southwestern coast of Texas, particularly in the region of the Rio Grande, and from some interior points, give accounts of a great rainstorm and much destruction of property. From the 21st to the 23rd Sept., a tremendous rainstorm and hurricane swept over the vicinity of Brownsville, Tex., including Matamoros.

At Point Isabel the quarantine station was swept away and other damage was done. A four-masted steamer was wrecked fifty miles south of the mouth of the Rio Grande, and is said to be a total loss.

Judge Rose, at Toronto, has given a decision that will tend to prevent one way of evading the provisions of the Scott Act. A Bowmanville druggist had been fined for selling medicines containing so much alcohol that it was reasonable to think that it was whiskey, and not medicine, that the purchaser desired.

It is understood that one hundred more Roumanian Jews will be landed in Montreal this week. Steps are to be taken to move the Dominion government in the matter with a view to have the landing of paupers interdicted for the future.
