The Yankees picked up a game on Chicago, defeating Washington 5-2 as Kansas City shaded the White Sox 3-2 in 13 innings.

Brooklyn, seven games behind Milwaukee, missed a chance to close in when they bowed 5-2 to New York Giants in the last game of the Polo Grounds. Philadelphia moved within a half game of the fourth place Redlegs, splitting a double header with Pittsburgh. The Phils won the opener 7-4 and the Pirates took the second 6-2.
