A WARNING TO OTHERS.—The Summerside Journal says: The dishonest custom of sending through the mails letters, articles of wearing apparel and other things enclosed in newspapers, has become of late so common that action had to be taken by the Post Office department to protect that branch of the public service from these very numerous infractions of the law. Assistant Post Office Inspector Brecken came from Charlottetown the other day with ample proof against several persons in this town to convict them of the above offence, but he only took action in one case. The minimum fine of \$10 was imposed by Stipendiary Magistrate at the request of the Inspector and the defendant was given a wholesome lecture, which should prove beneficial and be a lesson to other offenders. The maximum fine for breaking the law in above manner is \$40 accompanied by imprisonment.

POLICE COURT.—This morning John Priddy, jr., was arraigned on complaint of a woman named Jane Peter, who lives at the east end of the city. Jane, in her complaint, charged that John, while under the influence of liquor, knocked in the door of her residence causing material injuries thereto. His Honor imposed a nominal fine of five cents and costs, the defendant having made good the damage and the prosecutor declining to prosecute. Nathaniel DeCoursey was fined \$5 and costs for allowing a nuisance to exist on his premises. The Magistrate said that if the premises were cleaned up to the entire satisfaction of the Sanitary Officer within three days, the fine would be reduced, otherwise the full amount would be exacted. Another man charged with a similar offence, who had to the meantime abated the nuisance complained of, was fined five cents and costs. Two persons citing with non-payment of dog tax contributed \$1 and costs each to the treasury. Several other delinquents have been summoned to appear tomorrow.

SUPREME COURT.

TUESDAY, June 26. Robert Sinclair, of Summerside, obtained an order for examination to be admitted a student in the law office of K. J. Martin, Summerside.

The Chief Justice delivered judgment on a Scott Act case tried in Georgetown last February term, wherein the Magistrate having dismissed the information, convicted the appellant on a second information for the same offence. The court allowed the appeal, quashing the conviction with costs. W. S. Stewart, Q. C., for appellant, Attorney General for respondent.

The Master of the Rolls delivered judgment on the following cases tried at Summerside last June term: Craig vs. Burns, an absent debtor.—In this case the court held that it is necessary to prove not only that the defendant is absent from the Province, but that he has absconded with a fraudulent intent. It must be proved that some property has been attached in which the defendant has some interest. The plaintiff having failed to do this, his suit was dismissed. Mr. Bell for plaintiff.

Gillis vs. Steele.—The plaintiff in this case claimed under a deed from the sheriff on a sale ordered by the Surrogate, under the Intestacy Amendment Act, the Court held that the Surrogate had no power to order a sale in these circumstances, and if he had, the proceedings were defective, not showing authority of the Surrogate on their face. The court refused to non-suit, however, because on the merits of the case the plaintiff was entitled to a verdict, and it appearing that Steele had conveyed the property to one Cameron, who died intestate, Steele's wife (Cameron's sister) being Cameron's heir-at-law, Steele was not, therefore, seized of the lands, and the Surrogate had no power to order the sale.

Thompson vs. Thompson, an action of replevin.—The argument in this case was upon some technical questions as to the effect of special plea, which was fully considered by the court. The court, on the merits, held that the defendant was entitled to judgment, the question being the ownership by father and son of a threshing machine, the court holding that they were joint owners.

McQuarrie vs. Powers, an action of debt on a note.—The chief question in this case was the effect in the courts of this country of a foreign judgment received in the United States for the cause of action being tried. The law of the country of nations was fully considered, and the court held the doctrine of non-merger, i. e., the cause of action was not merged in the foreign judgment. On this plea the court gave judgment for the plaintiff. The defendant also set up a claim of partnership, alleging community of profits, but the court held that although community of profits is a test, it is not a conclusive one; but it is necessary that the intention of the parties should be expressed in their agreement.

Ellis vs. Dunn.—This was an action of ejectment involving a complicated question of surveys and lines and entirely a question of fact. A verdict was rendered for plaintiff for twelve acres, part of the lands claimed.

In the matter of a habeas corpus of Hiram Woodside. In this case the applicant had become liable on a judgment recovered under the Summary Conviction Act, and was escaping from Summerside to Point du Cluene, but the constable having boarded the boat and lain in wait till Woodside appeared from the room, midway on the straits, when he immediately arrested him and brought him back to Summerside and compelled him to pay \$12, which he did under protest. The court now holds that the arrest was illegal, and orders the money to be paid back to Woodside.

LAYING THE CORNER STONE.—A goodly number of persons drove out from the city today to witness the laying of the corner stone of the new Roman Catholic Cathedral in the course of erection at Kelly's Cross. The ceremony was to be performed by His Lordship Bishop Macdonald, and the sermon on the occasion was to be preached by Rev. Dr. Morrison. There is a tea party in connection with the ceremony, the proceeds to go towards the church fund. The Church is a large and very handsome edifice. It was designed by Mr. W. C. STRAYED AWAY.—The four year old son of a man named Huestis, living at Cavendish, strayed away from his mother while she was doing some shopping in the Long House, about four o'clock yesterday afternoon, and about four hours later the little fellow was found trudging along the Malpeque Road in the vicinity of St. Dunstan's College. The child was taken into a neighboring house, where he soon fell asleep, being exhausted after his long tramp. In the meantime his parents and the police made a diligent search of the city. The joy of the parents on recovering their lost child can be better imagined than described.

AN ISLANDER MURDERED.—A private letter received from Denver, Col., brings the sad news that Francis Murphy, son of Mr. John M. Murphy, of South Shore, was brutally murdered at Denver by a German named Chris Schram, on the 8th inst. It appears that Murphy had a house rented from Schram to which some repairs were to be made. On the morning that the repairs were to be made Schram was in a very surly mood, and when Murphy put in an appearance he attacked him with a chisel, striking two blows with it, the second of which pierced his heart, causing almost instant death. Schram was promptly arrested. Murphy was twenty-six years of age, and had been married only five months.

FIREMEN'S TOURNAMENT.—Several weeks ago it was announced that the firemen of St. John had decided to hold a firemen's tournament in that city on the 14th and 15th of August next, and that the firemen of Halifax, Charlottetown, and other places were to be invited. If the Charlottetown firemen are expected to take part in the celebration, they must be given some time in which to train for the different events.
