See Death After Heart Operation From Blood-clot

TORONTO (CP)—Steelworker Alexander Gillis, 47, of Sydney, who died six days after a heart operation paid for by friends and fellow workers, may have suffered and "embolus" (blood-clot) blockage of a brain artery, doctors said Friday.

The father of 11 children, whose ages range from 21 years to 11 months, needed the operation so that he could return to work in a Sydney steel mill. He was operated on last Saturday and was said Monday to be improving.

Thursday, however, he was up and washing himself when he suddenly became short of breath, said Dr. R. W. Gunton. By noon he had developed a high temperature. He died in the afternoon.

"There is a likelihood," said Dr. Gunton, "although we can't be absolutely certain, that a blood clot within the lung or heart travelled to his brain."

AUTOPSY UNLIKELY An autopsy, and none was considered likely to be done here, would have to be made before a definite diagnosis of death could be ascertained.

Mr. Gillis had been employed at the steel works since 1936 but since 1945 a heart ailment allowed him to work less and less. In 1953 he was confined to bed for the entire year.

A plant-wide collection raised \$1,074 within 24 hours when it was learned he needed \$1,500 for the operation, and other expenses. Friends and relatives made good the balance.

Dr. Gordon Murray, who performed the operation and had been optimistic about its results, agreed with Dr. Gunton's diagnosis. Both said it was an unusual complication after such an operation.

Expect Eisenhower's Illness To Have Big Election Impact

WASHINGTON (AP)—However serious or slight it may turn out to be, President Eisenhower's latest illness can be expected to have an impact on the 1956 campaign wars.

Even if the president recovers swiftly, the issue of his health might very likely become an increased talking point in the campaign. How it might affect the attitudes of voters is anybody's guess.

Up to now they have been pretty much inclined to ignore presidential health as an election issue. If the illness should prove severe and prolonged there would inevitably arise the big question as to whether Eisenhower would stay in the presidential race. He has said that he would not remain in the presidency if he ever felt he wasn't physically up to handling it.

It is ever should come to that, the door would be open for a historical battle-royal among Republican aspirants including such men as vice-president Nixon, Senator William F. Knowland of California, Governor Christian A. Herter of Massachusetts and others.

ENHANCES STEVENSON Similarly it would enhance the strategic value of the recent string of victories Adlai Stevenson has won in Democratic presidential primaries. His wins in Oregon, Florida and California have put him in the forefront of Democratic contenders.

For the moment, many Democrats put aside politics and joined Republicans in expressions of hope that the president's intestinal ailment isn't serious.

One thing seems sure: in the months ahead, GOP politicians probably will do their utmost to encourage the attitude that a healthy man is needed in the White House.

Democratic chairman Paul Butler has been saying Eisenhower's health is an issue and the president and "the men around him," not the Democrats, have made it one. Butler also has been hammering on the idea that, apart from health, Eisenhower is "a part time president" because of absences from his desk.

Anglican Primate Raps Minister

TORONTO (CP)—The Anglican primate of Canada has knuckled-rapped a Toronto minister who last month charged Canadian workmen with "low sense of responsibility."

The primate, Most Rev. W. F. Barfoot of Winnipeg, said in a letter to the Allied Printing and Trades Council that Rev. M. B. Parker's action was "breach of privilege."

Mr. Parker, who directs the Anglican Book Centre here, was asked by the printing council in a letter to direct more of the Anglican workmen's printing work to Canadian rather than United States shops.

In his reply the director had said: "I am very much concerned about the low sense of responsibility that exists among Canadian workmen. The church can never support what is, in reality, dishonesty where people refuse to do their best and give their best to their job."

"Very few of us today can be proud of Canadian workmanship in any product," he said.

Report Hit-and-Run Victim Identified

FREDERICTON (CP)—The presumed victim of a hit-and-run driver whose body was found beside highway 2 below Burton Wednesday night has been identified as Clyde Herman Parker, 38, of Hazelton, Northumberland County.

The man was the son of John William Parker of the small community near Doaktown and was identified Friday by Mrs. Margaret Atherton, also of Hazelton, a sister of the deceased. The man had come to the Ormococt district to seek work.

The body was found lying by the side of the highway between 10:30 and 11 p.m. Wednesday by Harold Gamble of Burton. A jury empaneled by Senator F.A. McGraw, Fredericton Junction, coroner for Sunbury County, viewed the body last night. Date of the inquest is still indefinite.

Members of the Fredericton detachment of the R.C.M.P., who investigated the death, stated that the driver of a truck and the driver may not have been aware of the accident. An intensive search has failed to find the vehicle.
