EYSTON WILL SEEK MORE NEW MARKS

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah, July 14—Captain George Eyston of London humbled the sports world in one spectacular thrust today—but still wasn't satisfied. The tall Englishman crumbled three score records—every recognized mark from 500 kilometers to 48 hours—under the spinning wheels of "Speed of the Winds" motor had cooled, the doughty Briton told newsmen: "I'll be back next summer for an assault on the short distance records." Eyston sent his two-ton giant streaking over 182,529 miles of glistering track in one hour 10 days ago for an new international record. Striking again while the sun shone, Eyston hopped into his mechanical thunderbolt Sunday, aided by relief driver Bert Denly, also of London, he brought the speedster to a standstill today, the Rolls Royce special had traveled 6,546 miles in 48 hours at an average speed of 136.354 miles an hour. Averaged 149.09 miles an hour for 24 hours. Smashed the record for 5,000 miles, with 142.61 miles an hour. Broken other records so numerous American Automobile Association officials said final calculations could not be completed for weeks. The old 48-hour record of 109.54 was held by three Frenchmen—Perrot, Dhomé and Girod. The same trio held the 5,000 mark—109.89. The 24-hour 140.52 miles an hour average was chalked up by Eyston himself.
