The State of Ireland.

The news from Ireland is very con- tradictory; but it all goes to prove that the country is just now in a state of distraction to be deplored by all who love peace and hate strife.

But it is pretty evident that the present disorder in Ireland will not be of long duration. By merely reading between the lines of the manifestos and proclama- tions they have issued, it is easy to see that the leaguers have received a thorough scare; and the country will, in all probability, soon be "lawful" again.

THE STATE OF IRELAND, AND THE CRISIS IMPENDING—A FEW QUOTATIONS.

PROGRESS OF THE PEOPLE.

I do not believe that there is a laboring population in all Europe (although the condition of the Irish laborer still leaves much to be desired) which in the course of the last twenty years has made the progress from the extreme point of depression equal to that of the Irish laborer.

DECISION OF THE CLERGY.

The Roman Catholic Bishops, owing in a great degree to the unfortunate circum- stances of the country, have been for many generations the habitual and trusted advisers of the people.

MR. DILLON.

Let me do justice to a gentleman whose name is in Ireland respected amongst those who differ most widely from him, and who was lately confined in prison. Mr. Dillon the member for Tipperary, is a man of the most extreme opinions upon every question connected with the nationality of Ireland.

DANIEL O'CONNELL.

Half a century ago the people of Ireland gave their confidence to Mr. O'Connell, a man of most remarkable gifts and powers, but not always acceptable in his opinion to the people of his country, a man in respect of whom it must be owned that he had these five characteristics—he always declared his loyalty to the Crown, he always declared his desire for friendly relations with Great Britain, he always declared his respect for Great Britain, and he never stamped that declaration, so far as I know, by a word or act in contravention to it.

loyalty to the Crown of England. Mr. Parnell says if the Crown of England is to be the link between the two countries it must be the only link; but whether it is to be the link at all—I am not quoting his words—is a matter on which he has not, I believe, given any opinion whatsoever.

PARNELL AND THE LAND ACT.

I believe that the people of Ireland desire, in accordance with the advice of their bishops and trusted friends, to make a fair trial of the Land Act—(hear, hear)—and if they do, you may rely upon it that it will give peace to the country—peace which is not the object of those men; and, therefore, in the prosecution of their policy, the very thing which is, most of all, necessary for them to do is to intercept the progress of the Land Act.

THE RESULT.

These opinions are called forth by the grave state of facts. I do not give them to you as anything more than opinions, but they are opinions sustained by references to words and actions. They all have reference to this great impending crisis, in which we depend on the good sense of the people, and in which we are determined that no force, and no fear of force, and no fear of ruin through force, shall, as far as we are concerned, prevent the Irish people from having the free and full benefit of the Land Act; and, if, when we have that short further experience to which I have referred, if it should then appear that there is still to be fought the final conflict in Ireland between law on the one side and sheer lawlessness on the other—if the law, purged from defect and from any taint of injustice, is still to be refused, and the first condition of political society to remain unfulfilled, then I say, gentlemen, without hesitation, that the resources of civilization are not yet exhausted.
