MIDSUMMER EXAMINATION.

It is pleasing to note an ever increasing interest in this school, on the part of parents and other citizens. The attendance of visitors was much larger to-day than on the occasion of any previous examination—so large indeed that we find it impossible to give the list of those present. We think we correctly represent the opinions of those of the visitors most competent to form a proper estimate of the condition of the school, when we say that its discipline is admirable and that the progress of the pupils has been marked. There are on the roll 509 pupils, mostly girls; and the daily average attendance is 362. The teachers are: Miss Smith, (Principal,) Miss Snaddon, Miss Moore, Miss Barr, Miss Gregor, Miss M. Lawson, Miss Mitchell, Miss McNeill, and Miss McLeod—a very efficient staff. This is, we believe, the largest school in the town, and the work done in it is certainly second to none of the others. Yet we see by the accounts, that the Principal does not receive anything like the remuneration given to Principals of the other schools. We assume that the reason the Board of Trustees have not given any prizes this year is that, with the amount saved, they may, in respect to salary, put Miss Smith on a level with Mr. Gaul and Mr. Miller. After the examination a good musical and literary entertainment, was given by the pupils. Particulars to-morrow.

Walking Tournament.

THE walking tournament under the management of Hartigan & Diggins, of Halifax, came off in the Skating Rink yesterday. Six contestants entered, viz., Leggett, Sussex, N. B., Fransham, Hogan, Hennessy, Lightizer, and Flynn, all of the city. The prizes were, \$50 to first, \$20 to second, and \$10 to third, and was awarded as follows: 1st prize, Leggett, 2nd Hogan, and 3rd Lightizer. The track was laid off on the ground inside the Rink, and contained nineteen laps to the mile. Mr. C. Callaghan was appointed referee. A start was made at 11 o'clock, a. m., all, with the exception of Fransham, who complained of a pain in his side, were in first class order. Leggett led off with several laps to his credit on the second hour, followed by Lightizer, Fransham and Hogan. Flynn, who had been badly equipped, retired from the track after walking fourteen miles. Fransham retired, from indisposition, after walking 34 miles and 13 laps, and Hennessy also retired when he completed 34 miles and 11 laps. The contest was now between Leggett, Hogan and Lightizer. Hogan, who had taken second place during the 5th hours, held that position and walked in good style to the finish, which took place at 9.15 p. m. On the 9th hour the score stood:

At the close of the walking match a five-mile go-as-you-please took place, in which six contestants started, viz.: Dockendorff, John Flood, Archd. McKinnon, Fredk. Bevan, Job Bevan, jr., and Thomas Sweeney. It was won by Fredk. Bevan in 34 minutes, with Dockendorff second, and Job Bevan, jr., a lad of 12 years of age, fourth. There being no fourth prize, a purse of \$7 was made up by the spectators and presented to Job, jr.
