Editorial Notes.

The Freeman's Journal takes a gloomy view of Lord Randolph Churchill's proposed visit to Belfast to confer with the leading men of that city on the Irish question. It predicts that his visit will be attended with riot. Gladstone's letter of the 12th to Lord De Vesce is a disappointment to the Irish press. It is generally interpreted as an attempt on the part of Gladstone to gain time.

Forty-one notices have already appeared in the Canada Gazette for charters for railways, or for amendments to existing charters, to be asked from Parliament at the coming session. Four of these relate to railways in the Maritime Provinces, two to Quebec, seventeen to Ontario, sixteen to Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, and three to British Columbia. This is interpreted as a healthy sign. Certainly, capitalists have not lost confidence in the future of Canada.

The Boston Herald recites over the different points in dispute, the privations to which American fishermen will be subjected, and the probable result if attempts are made to encroach upon Canadian waters. Briefly, the American fishermen will be excluded from the following privileges:

(1) No new treaty having been arranged, the fisheries will be regulated under the provisions of the treaty of 1818. By this the American fishermen are prohibited, except in case of distress, from entering a Canadian port or fishing within three miles from the shore, the line being drawn from headland to headland.

(2) It has been proved that fresh bait is better than salt bait. Americans will be prohibited from obtaining fresh bait from Canadians, and their catch will be proportionately diminished.

(3) American fishermen will be debarred from discharging their cargo at a Canadian port and forwarding it by rail while they return to the fishing grounds. These advantages the Gloucestermen either pretend to despise or calculate upon obtaining by fraud.

(1) They hold the Canadian inshore fishery is worthless. Whether that be true or not, the hundred of American vessels that yearly engage in it, show they do not really consider it so.

(2) American fishermen reckon upon obtaining fresh bait from Canadians by having it brought beyond the three mile limit in boats.

(3) Discharging cargoes at Canadian ports is a point that has not been very seriously considered by our American friends. As they expect to have a monopoly of the American market, and will be rid of keen Canadian competition they do not perhaps lay so much stress upon this privilege as it deserves. The American people at large, as the price of fish advances, will be far more apt to do it justice.

Mr. Secretary Manning, has sent to the Speaker of the House of Representatives a long letter upon the revision of the tariff of the United States, in which he says: "My opinion in regard to our existing tariff law is clear and positive, and is confirmed more and more by every day's widening experience in the administration of this department. Since my annual report was submitted, the need of additional legislation has, in my opinion, become more imperative. Two courses are, as I endeavored to intimate in my annual report, open to Congress. One is an enlargement of the free list, a reduction of the number of dutiable articles, a prudent substitution of specific for ad valorem rates and a thorough revision and change of the existing rates and system. The other is in the direction of deterrent legislation, which shall, by more stringent rules and new contrivances in the form of fines and punishments, so operate on the fears of importers as to induce them to present truthful invoices and make entry a correct declaration of the foreign value. The two courses are not necessarily alternative. Both may be pursued together. The secretary then alludes to what he terms the ambiguity and confusion of the present tariff laws. He hopes that it will be apparent that he fully appreciated whatever superiority the aid system of custom taxation and low ad valorem rates may have over specific rates, and goes on to say so long as the disposition of Congress shall be to continue to levy higher war duties upon some thousand imported articles specific duties levied on all imported articles, and especially on all articles of clothing would for them be oppressive and unjust. The system of specific rates must be adjusted and arranged with regard to values, and therefore, when prices of imported articles are, as now, tending downward, specific rates are obviously increasing without a textual change in the law.

Gladstone's eldest son is a mild-mannered retiring young man of enormous physical strength.

Spring wheat sowing began at Maple Creek, on the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, on the 4th of February.

The Anglo-Austrian bank at Vienna has given notice of a reduction of interest on deposits of half of one per cent, owing to stagnation of business.

It is alleged on what seems to be first-rate authority that Confucius never spoke a word during dinner. Let's see; was there a Mrs. Confucius?

There are 150,000,000 tons of coal waste piled up in the anthracite coal regions, which, under a lately discovered process, is now being utilized.

A Butler, Pa., citizen sent 25 cents to learn how to make \$50 a week at home working on a capital of \$1, and received the following printed slip: "Fish for fools, as I do."

A cedar tree, standing in Middle Branch township, Osceola County, Mich., measures 13 feet 10 inches in circumference, three feet from the root, and is sound as a root.

The Sultan has engaged two German apothecaries at \$5,000 a year to put up prescriptions for his household. He doesn't propose to pay \$1.50 for three cents worth of tannic acid and simple syrup.

A retreat for the Anglican church is to be held at St. Alban's church, Ottawa, in the beginning of next month. Two days will be devoted to silent prayer, during which almost absolute silence is enforced.

A despatch from Paris to the Times says that so far Greece is the only country that has offered to assist at the exhibition to be held in 1889, and it is possible that the project will be abandoned on account of the lack of interest shown by the other nations.

The Daily News says that the British Government's Greek policy is founded in the belief that war between Turkey and Greece would postpone rather than accelerate the settlement of the Greek claims. Greece, the News declares, must trust Gladstone and yield.

In 1835, the year before Queen Victoria's accession, Melbourne was called Beargrass, and consisted of thirteen houses, or rather hovels. Melbourne is now the seventh city of the British Empire. London, Liverpool, Glasgow, Manchester, Birmingham and Calcutta take precedence.

When the New Zealanders want to tame a horse they decoy him into a swamp until his legs are firmly imbedded. Then the women sit on him, the men bestride him, and the children crawl over him while their mothers shake their dresses in his face. When dug out the horse is tame.

The skeleton of the celebrated Bishop Courtenay has just been discovered in the vaults of the old Cathedral of Winchester. It was this valorous ecclesiastic who was the leader of the Lancastrians in Richard III's time, and went into exile with his brother in the cause of Henry Tudor. He is an ancestor of the present Earl of Devon.

A man named Grantmyre is under arrest for the murder of Capt. McDonald near Sydney, C. B., on a coroner's warrant, and is admitted to bail. Deceased's vest and watch were given up by Grantmyre. It has transpired that two coats and a valise, the property of deceased, were left by his travelling companion, McLean, at Murdoch McDonald's, Little Bras d'Or, without explanation.

A Regina Leader representative visited the barracks on Thursday last. Dressy Man, sentenced to penal servitude for life, weeps almost continually over his sad fate. He denies that Policeman Cowan was alive when he cut his heart out as a trophy for Big Bear. Dressy Man is a sorry specimen of an ex-rebel. He is about 70 years of age, stooped, palsied and completely broken up. Humanly speaking, he cannot live more than two years.

A prize fight took place a few days ago near Paris between Greenfield and Smith, for the English heavy-weight championship and \$1,000 a side. The men fought over an hour with varying fortune, when some roughs broke into the ring and interrupted the contest. The referee declared the match a draw. The fight, however, was in favor of Smith. The excitement was very great and \$100,000 were staked on the result. Greenfield is from Birmingham while Smith is from London. Each man had with him twenty bruisers hired at £5 a piece to protect his interest. The Birmingham roughs broke down the ring and compelled a stoppage of the fight because Smith was evidently on the point of winning.
