Mr. Charles McKay has returned to his home in Park Corner after spending a prolonged visit, the

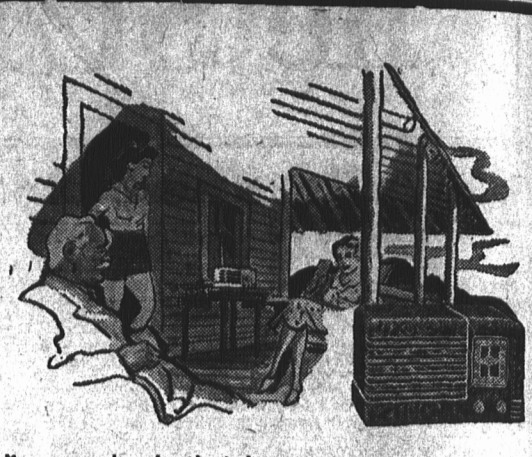
