Snow Ices Highways, Driving Is Hazardous

Motorists proceeded at a snail's pace last night as island roads turned to ice from two inches of snow at a temperature of 23 degrees.

A spokesman at the Charlottetown radio range recorded 2.2 inches of snowfall at 9:15 p.m. West north west winds of 20 miles per hour, gusting to 28, made for poor visibility in rural areas.

Salt was being placed at corners and intersections in Charlottetown last night by city workers and the department of highways was distributing sand on main roads.

Motorists travelling on Elm Avenue were hesitant when meeting each other for fear of slipping on ice.

Only two accidents were reported by the City Police and Charlottetown Detachment RCMP who said driving was "very slippery".

A collision involving cars reportedly driven by Alphonse Maloy, 21 Bayfield Street, and Marjorie Dalgard, 17 Upper Hillsboro Street, occurred at the intersection of Queen and Euston Streets about 8 p.m.

A member of the city police said there was only slight damage and no one was injured.

The RCMP detachment in Charlottetown reported that a Maritime Electric truck driven by Allen Brown of York left the road at Springvale about 5:50 p.m. The driver who reportedly lost control of his vehicle, was not injured.

Supreme Court Has No Cases

GEORGETOWN — The November sitting of the Supreme Court for King's County was held in the court house in Georgetown yesterday with Judge Mark R. McGuigan presiding. There were no cases on the docket.

The fall report for King's County Jail, covering the period from May 4, 1965 to November 2, 1965, showed a total of 182 persons admitted. Of that number the greater majority was for cases involving liquor with 58 persons placed in custody of liquor while 55 were taken into custody for having the care or control of a motor vehicle while impaired.

The court was adjourned after this report.

Liberals Said Lacking Leadership Succession

The makeup of leadership in the national Liberal party was the prime target of Dr. J. A. MacMillan last night as he spoke at a Queens county Conservative rally in Hunter River.

Some 100 people were gathered at Central Queens Regional High School to hear Dr. MacMillan speak on behalf of Heath Macquarrie and J. Angus MacLean, Progressive Conservative team-mates in the dual riding of Queens. Mrs. Jean Waddell, MP for Grenville-Dundas in the last Parliament was also a platform guest.

"In every political party there must be adequate provision for leadership succession," Dr. MacMillan said, "and in the long history of the national Liberal party this provision has always been obviously lacking. "Since the days of Mackenzie King the Liberal party has not been led by a professional politician and the Liberal leaders of recent years must be tools of the party in order to lead."

"John Diefenbaker leads in a different manner. He has a great Canadian dream and keeps coming back after each setback stronger than before. He is a professional politician who has shown in the past he has the strength of conscience to do what he thinks is right and is not dictated to by the party body."

"The controlling forces of the Liberal party have delusions of grandeur," Angus MacLean added to Dr. MacMillan's statements. "They attempted to manipulate the electorate of Canada like pawns in a game when they sent the nation to the polls in an attempt to get approval for a government that has shown itself not worthy of governing this nation."

"It is the will of the people who have judged the issues and the records that sends a government to Ottawa," Heath Macquarrie added, "and the people of Canada will not approve of the sordid affairs of the past few months of government."

Highways minister Phillip Matheson and Industry Minister Lloyd MacPail also spoke at the meeting which was conducted by Amos Gallant.

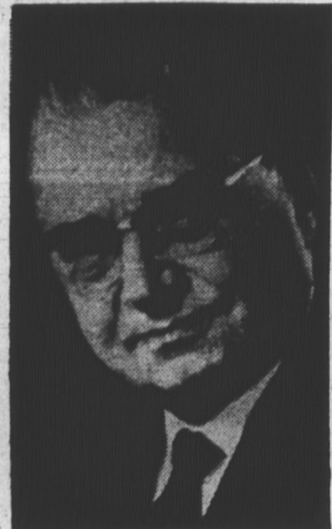
