SIR W. C. McDONALD.

By his princely gifts to McGill University, William C. McDonald, of Montreal, has conferred a continual boon upon Canada and the world at large. He deserves the gratitude of his country as truly as any man in it ever did. Others have made fortunes, but none has used money more prudently or beneficently. Independently of the fact that he was born and bred and educated in this Province, we are delighted that his great and meritorious service to the State has been formally recognized and rewarded by the head of the State. So far as he is personally concerned the value of a title is as nothing. His name would in any case have gone down to each succeeding generation of Canadians as the benefactor of McGill. But the title of Knight Commander of St. Michael and St. George, which he has received from the gracious hands of the Queen, is the distinguishing mark of his country's approval and gratitude. As such it will, we feel sure, be highly prized. We congratulate Sir William McDonald's relatives and friends in this Province, including particularly his brother, John A. McDonald, Esq., of Glensadale, and his cousin, the Hon. F. De St. Croix Brecken, of this city.

RESULTS OF THE WAR.

HENRY CLEWS declares, in the course of his latest circular, that the effect of the American-Spanish war is going to be further reaching than even dreamers of America's destiny have ever pictured. It will be says, in the end, lead to a commercial revolution amongst nations. As a result of the war the United States have gained the Philippine Islands and thereby made the Pacific Ocean of vastly more importance to them than it otherwise could have been. It gives the States a front door entrance to China and Asia for the distribution of their products and manufactured goods which in time will be superior to that of the European competitors. The great railroads of the States now centre at Chicago, which place has been made important through its connection with the lakes. The lakes and the railroads, together, have developed abnormally only certain localities of the country, whereas the next great development will not be where the lakes are located, but will be between ocean and ocean—from the Atlantic to the Pacific—which will make the railroads that span that territory the great highways of the world. The result of the war must force the building of the Panama and Nicaragua canals in the interests of the Republic, and when completed they will make the Caribbean Sea the rendezvous of the world's commerce, as they will furnish by far the nearest and cheapest mode of transportation to supply the 800,000,000 people at the Eastern side of the Pacific. The Atlantic and Pacific Oceans and the Caribbean Sea together are, Mr. Clews concludes, going to be more important in the future progress of development than can be imagined by the most enthusiastic.

THOSE ROAD ORDERS.

A few days THE EXAMINER made a statement touching road orders from East Prince. The Patriot demanded instant retraction or proof, and threatened vengeance. THE EXAMINER neither retracted nor proved, but repeated its former statement with greater definiteness than before. Now, The Patriot professes to be satisfied. What has happened? UNITED STATES TRADE

In the last three years the exports of merchandise from the United States exceeded the imports of the like classes by \$1,249,540,000. For the year 1898, the value of the exports of the United States will amount to \$1,200,000,000. This great sum approximates closely to that of the value of the total exports of Great Britain. Great Britain's total exports aggregate the enormous amount of \$1,455,000,000 a year. But the United States are, in spite of protection, easily second in point of trade with the world at large; and they are catching up to Great Britain. Their domestic trade is beyond calculation.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The *Moniteur Acadien* gives currency to a rumor that Mr. Amédée Gallant, M. P., elect for the First District of Prince, will resign his seat sooner than face the election court set down for Wednesday next, 28th inst. An islander tells us, says our contemporary, "that this will deprive the public of some very interesting revelations."

—We have the pleasure of acknowledging the receipt, from Mr. Ernest A. Earle, of the British Columbia Year Book for 1898. It is, as usual, a creditable work and contains information regarding every industry and resource of that Province. It must be confessed that the Western Province makes a fine showing in the book, and we cannot help thinking that if some such effort were made to "boom" our own Island Province, the result would materially add to our prosperity as we became better known to the outside world.

—Remarking on the commercial travelers tax imposed by the Grit Government of P. E. Island and the recent amendment to it the *Canadian Gazette* published in London says: "This is going from bad to worse with a vengeance. The original legislation was shortsighted and foolish, and, as any business man may see, was only a clumsy and costly method of indirectly taxing the Islanders themselves, by whom in the long run, the tax must be paid. But for the later proposal a shadow of excuse can be forth coming. Why should any debtor's liability be wiped off because the creditor owes the Province fifteen dollars? At the present moment the land awaits the approval of the Dominion authorities, and it is to be hoped that a tender regard for the Provincial rights will not prevent the use of the veto power which appears to be urgently called for in this instance."

—The *Canada Educational Monthly*, for December, contains an interesting article from the pen of Mr G J McCormac, on the Growth of P. E. Island Educationally. The conclusion arrived at by Mr McCormac is that—"Our schools to-day are in a healthy and flourishing condition; they are no longer held down by brute force or taught incompetently or irrationally. The teachers of this province are alert and active as a body, and do their duties faithfully. The C. P. R. express is no farther ahead of the lumbering stage coach than the P. E. I. school of to-day is ahead of the school of twenty years ago. The moral, social, intellectual, and industrial circumstances of the people have all changed. The old log schoolhouse is a thing of the past, and our school houses, with very few exceptions, are very comfortable, well furnished, and well lighted."

THE FRUIT SHIPMENT.

SIR—In reply to a "Fruit Grower," in yesterday's *EXAMINER*, permit me to say that the gentlemen who entrusted me with apples to be shipped to England on their own account have had their cheques sent them, and if any of them wish to see the details of the transaction, I will be happy to show them the accounts which will be submitted to the Fruit Growers' Association. If Mr. Edward Bayfield has published the exact price netted by the farmers for each variety of apples shipped, I have not seen it. But "Fruit Growers" will, no doubt, find that the fullest information will be furnished through the Fruit Growers' Association.
