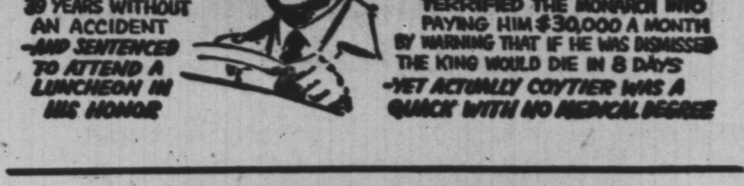

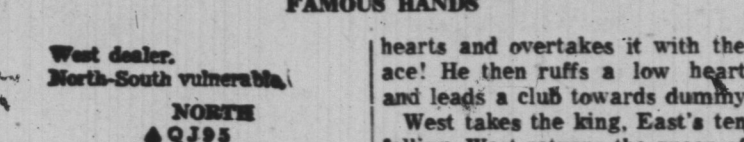

Opening lead—king of diamonds.

Anyone who would like to try to make five clubs doubled on this hand is welcome to the job. Special dispensation is granted to the would-be solver to look at all 52 cards.

The hand was played and made many years ago by the veteran West Coast Star, Bill Savery, of Seattle. Only the most exact timing by declarer permits the contract to be made, assuming the best possible defense.

South wins the diamond lead with the ace, plays the king of hearts and overtakes it with the ace! He then ruffs a low heart and leads a club towards dummy. West takes the king, East's ten falling. West returns the queen of diamonds, his best defensive play. Dummy ruffs, and the ten of hearts is next trumped.

Now declarer ruffs another diamond in dummy, establishing his diamond suit, but reducing dummy's trump holding to the lone queen. The queen of hearts is then ruffed, after which South cashes the A-K of spades.

Ten tricks have been played, West has won one trick, and this is the situation with the lead in declarer's hand:

1958 Banner Year For P.E.I. Fishing; Catch, Earnings Up

OTTAWA, (Special) — Prince Edward Island fishermen enjoyed a banner year in 1958, for their catch and earnings up over 1957.

The federal fisheries department disclosed Wednesday that in the 11-month period ended Nov. 30, fish caught in Island waters totalled 38,576,000 pounds and were valued at \$3,717,000.

This compares with a total catch of 38,406,000 pounds in 1957 which were worth \$3,482,000.

Figures for December have not yet been compiled in detail, but will show an improvement over the same month of 1957.

As was the case in 1957, the main fish caught last year were lobsters, cod, hake and herring. In value, lobsters again led the field by a wide margin.

Here are the leading catches for the 11-month period, with the 1957 figures in brackets:

Lobster, 7,969,000 pounds (8,508,000), with a value of \$2,510,000; cod, 7,728,000 pounds (7,552,000), valued at \$177,000; hake, 7,101,000 pounds (6,289,000), value \$105,000; herring, 4,128,000 pounds (3,261,000), value \$51,000.

India's Congress Party Sees Need For Socialist Planning

NAGPUR, India (Reuters) — Members of India's ruling Congress party have concluded an annual conference stressing the need for socialist planning, widespread land reform and continued "non-alignment" in foreign policy.

The session, which ended Sunday night, was dominated by discussion of long-term economic planning. The emphasis was on state enterprise and the establishment of a "socialist co-operative commonwealth" in India.

Prime Minister Nehru and most of his followers maintained that the third five-year plan starting in 1961 should be bigger than its two predecessors.

The session decided to go ahead faster with land reforms. Party members adopted a resolution advocating radical agricultural reorganization.

Huge Spot On The Sun

LONDON (Reuters)—A massive sunspot, roughly 80,000 miles across, has appeared on the face of the sun; astronomers confirm Friday.

The spot, which will probably be the largest of the present cycle, was seen by many in Britain Thursday when haze in the sky made it possible to look directly at the sun.

The spots are areas on the sun surface which are about 2,000 degrees cooler than the normal temperature of about 6,000 degrees centigrade.

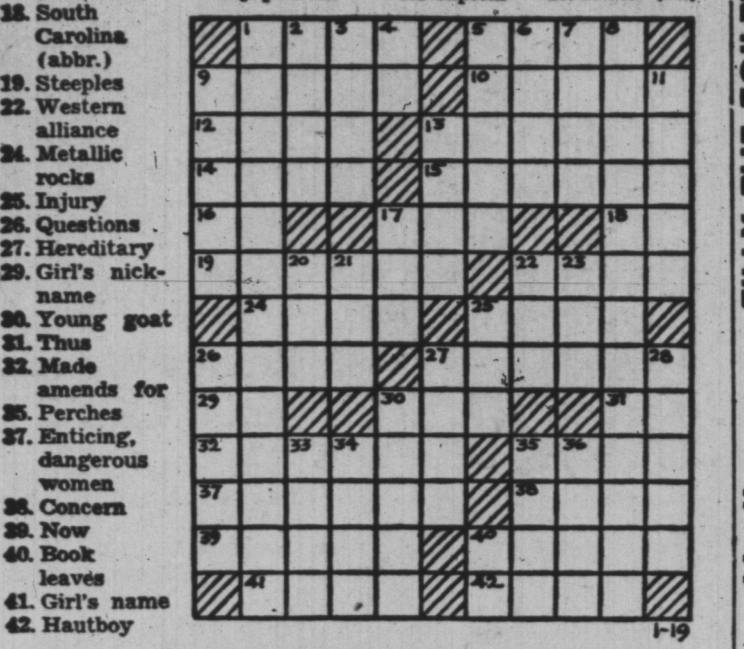
Spots occur in cycles which, on average, take place every 11 years and can be predicted. The present spot will, under the right conditions, be visible until Jan. 17.

The present cycle, which began in 1954, has been marked by a great quantity of sunspots.

Radio fadeouts, associated with the spots, began disrupting transatlantic communications Friday afternoon. London links with Australia were broken for 3½ hours Thursday night.

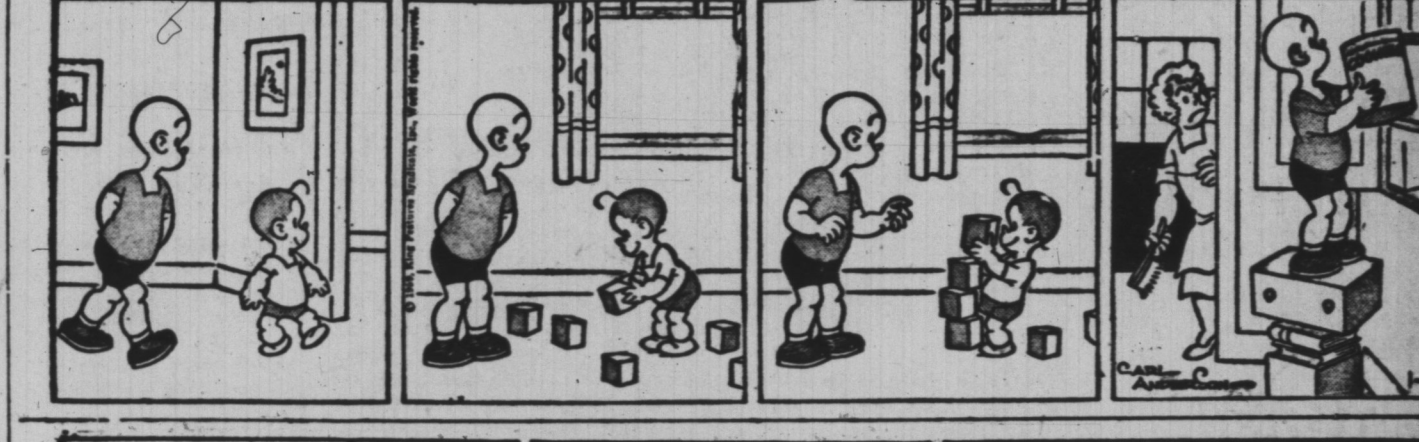
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
