THERE was a very large market to-day. Everything was in excess of demand. The following were the prices: Beef (small) from 8 to 15 cents; do. (gr.) from 7 to 9 cents; mutton, from 7 to 12 cents per lb.; lamb (gr.) from 40 cents to \$1.00; veal, from 3 to 7 cents per lb.; butter (fresh) from 16 to 20 cents per lb.; do. (tub) from 12 to 16 cents per lb.; eggs, from 9 to 12 cents per doz.; hay, from 50 to 60 cents per 100 lbs.; oats, from 38 to 40 cents per bush.; potatoes, from 20 to 25 cents do.; flour, per 100 lbs., \$3.00 to \$3.25; oatmeal do., from \$3 to \$3.25.

The Supreme Court met at three o'clock yesterday afternoon, and completed the case of Peter Trainor vs. Patrick Gormley. The jury retired, and after four hours returned a verdict for the plaintiff on the third count—damages 25 cents—and for the defendant on the first and second count. In the case of the Queen on the prosecution of J. S. Carvell vs. James Kelly and John Cavanagh, for larceny, the jury returned a verdict of guilty. At half-past four o'clock this evening the jury retired on the case of the Queen at the prosecution of J. S. Carvell vs. Fred. Davy, for harboring stolen goods, and up to the time of our going to press, have not returned.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)

LONDON, June 27.

The weather for the past few days has been intensely hot in England. It was hotter yesterday and to-day than ever known in June.

The funeral of the late Charles Matthews takes place at Kensal Green Cemetery on Saturday.

LIVERPOOL, June 27.

The Court of Inquiry delivered judgment to-day concerning the explosion on the steamship "Sardinian," in Moville Harbor, on the 10th May, on her passage from Liverpool to Quebec and Montreal. The Court was of opinion that the explosion was caused by the accumulation of coal gas without means being allowed for its escape, and to a light being introduced when the air was explosive. As no charge of negligence was brought by the Board of Trade, each party pays its own costs.

LONDON, July 27.

A Constantinople despatch says the dissatisfaction there at the progress of affairs at the Congress is increasing.

A Berlin correspondent states that until three days ago the proposal for the occupation of Bosnia and Herzegovina by Austrian troops was entirely disapproved by Congress, but a total change has occurred, and the Envoys are now resolved to empower Austria to occupy those Provinces.

The International Literary Congress accepted as their basis for its discussions, the principle advocated by Victor Hugo, that a book once published becomes in part the property of the Society, and after the author's death, his family cannot prevent its revision; but the author's heirs should be entitled to from five to ten per cent. of the profits. In case there are no heirs, the profits should revert to the State, to be applied to the encouragement of young writers.

HILLSBORO, N. B., June 28.

Mrs. Wilson, who was outraged yesterday by an Indian named Bernard, is not dead, as at first reported, but is in a very critical condition.

The Indian is still at large, but a great number of officers are searching both Counties for him.

Wanted—A Readjustment!

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR,—I am sure you will agree with me that the inhabitants of Prince Edward Island have every reason to congratulate themselves on being well governed—if the price they pay for their government be any criterion of its value. For the management of the internal affairs of a population of about 100,000, we have an Attorney General at a salary of \$1,600 per annum. True it is that he contrived to spare time from the legal affairs of the Province to act on its behalf in the Fishery arrangement with the United States; and, if this were included in his official emoluments, we will admit that for the past year it was well earned. But there are two little items in the Appropriation Act for "Crown Prosecutions" of \$7,500 and \$650! Then we have a Provincial Secretary and Treasurer (for home affairs only, of course) at \$1,600. He, I suppose, does the ornamental part of the office, as he has an assistant Secretary and an assistant Treasurer to do the work in each office, and the latter, in his turn, is assisted by a clerk. I suppose all those officers must find some employment in managing the Island Revenue, though in many countries larger funds are managed with much fewer hands in proportion. The next official is the Commissioner of Public Works (who, by the bye, is the most efficient of the group); but the Public Works in the Island are under the Local Government being so extensive, he is assisted by a Secretary and Engineer. But, then, Mr. Editor, we have the dignity of being a Province, and we have almost the machinery of a Kingdom. We have a little Parliament, the members of which are so patriotic and industrious that they each expend (of course for the Province) \$12 annually in stationery and postage. How many quires of paper they must cover! I should not like to pass over our deservedly respected Lieutenant Governor, who, with due reverence be it spoken, receives his little pension of \$650 as a retired Chief Justice (with which no one could find fault); but in addition to this, instead of enjoying his official dignity, he undertakes the onerous duties of Lieutenant Governor, drawing his salary from the Dominion. Truly, we are well governed; but the question may be asked, governed by whom? We do not pay too much for our whistle? Yours, &c., N.
