of many problems could be arrived at and several stated plainly that they would like to attend many meetings but it was impossible for them to go long distance to do so.
The damage to bird life caused by skunks and foxes was felt to be a matter of deep concern. One farmer said he had to keep prowling around his farm on numerous occasions to protect his valuable flock of poultry. A resolution was passed requesting The Department of Industry and Natural Resources to consider extending the bounty dates on skunks and foxes to the end of May and to consider increasing the bounties at least for part of the time that such bounties were in effect.
Another resolution that was passed after lengthy arguments was that shooting from boats on Pisiquid Lake be prohibited. Several expressed the view that they were not just clear as to how this could be done. However the discussion brought out some interesting points.
Some dissatisfaction was expressed over the fact that an aerial survey had been made by Dominion Government officials just a few days before the season opened with consequent disturbance to the birds and it was suggested that in future every effort be made to make such surveys at some other time than just previous to the opening of the season.
Mr. Erskine MacNutt, president of the Queen's County Branch presided at the meeting and Mr. Brighton MacDougall acted as secretary. Several very fine colored films were shown through the courtesy of the National Film Board and Mr. Dan Mullins of Mt. Stewart. Mr. Frank Acom of Charlottetown who took an active part in many of the general discussions also spoke about the present Hungarian Partridge and Ring Neck Pheasant situation, expressing his view that some new birds should be brought in for breeding purposes and the thought that he feels it is too soon to allow the shooting of hen pheasants.
Mr. Erskine MacNutt announced that Mr. George Boyer, Dominion wildlife officer would address a meeting next Thursday night, November 12th in the Vocational School at Charlottetown in connection with another meeting of the Queen's County Branch and invited those present to come into Charlottetown to attend this meeting. He feels Mr. Boyer may be able to answer some of the questions that are causing some disturbance in the minds of many hunters at the present time. Several complimentary remarks were made in regard to the good work being done by Mr. Spurgeon Jenkins, Provincial Fish and Game Enforcement Officer.

Abbott Urges Sounder Nato Military Economy

NEW YORK, (CP) - A Canadian cabinet minister said Thursday night that Canada is "genuinely concerned" with the "thin and rather brittle" economic base on which the North Atlantic countries have founded their political and military co-operation.
Canada's Finance Minister Abbott, called for bolder and speedier steps to expand world trade and strengthen this economic base to greatly improve "our whole defensive position."
"We all recognize the key position of the U. S.," he said in a speech prepared for delivery before the Academy of Political Science. "We expect you, as we expect other countries, to pursue policies that accord with your enlightened self-interest. . . If you really do this, we shall not be disappointed."
"We are convinced that the political and military security of

the free world must have a more solid economic base, for I am enough of an economic determinist to believe that if the economic base cracks again, it will be extremely difficult to maintain the measure of political understanding and military co-operation which now exists."
Mr. Abbott said he believes the sterling area is prepared to take firm and substantial steps toward the common goals of multilateralism, non-discrimination and convertibility - "If it can feel assured that it will be met half-way."
"We have been encouraged by the many indications that public opinion in the U. S. is moving along converging lines. We are convinced that every country, Canada, the U.K., the U.S. and the whole free world will benefit tremendously from moves in these directions. . ."

Plan Change In Managers of Big Defence Plant

OTTAWA, (CP) - United States J-47 jet engines are rapidly disappearing from the Canadian scene and as a result the government's biggest defence servicing plant will be under new management Jan. 1.
De Havilland Aircraft of Canada Ltd. is stepping in as managers of the \$2,500,000 jet engine repair and overhaul plant at Downsview, expanding supply hub of the RCAF in the northern suburbs of Toronto.
The defence production department Thursday announced it is negotiating with De Havilland to take over the plant from Canadian General Electric Co. Ltd., which built the structure and operated it for the government to service the J-47's, used to power Sabre jet fighters.
Now that the government has decided to power Canadian jet

fighters with the Canadian-built Orenda engine, built by A. V. Roe of Canada Ltd., Canadian General Electric has informed the department it no longer is "anxious" to run the plant.
The J-47 is built by OGE's parent company, General Electric, in the U.S. The government's decision is to power both the Sabre and the Canadian-designed CF-100 fighter with the Orenda and to use the Downsview plant principally for the repair and overhaul of these engines.
Most of Canada's J-47's are overseas, powering Canada's air division of Sabres now in Europe. The number of J-47's in RCAF service "will diminish rapidly," the department said.
