WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Word has been received that the Chilean government are ready to make reparation for all loss of life, limb and honor suffered by Americans. The despatch is couched in unsatisfactory terms.

Still Puzzles the Doctor's.
LONDON, January 19.—Influenza continues its ravages and extends its area of mischief. It has not yet become epidemic in London, but it spreads with extreme rapidity in places where it has once got a foothold. There were among 40,000 people 3,000 cases in French Dunkirk. Italy, next after England, is now said to be the favorite hunting-ground of this mauling, which still puzzles the doctors of all nations.

New York Herald's cable gives an affecting account of Princess May's grief at the bedside of the Duke of Clarence, her affianced husband.
Princess May stood beside the bedside of her royal lover, and through her blinding tears watched him as his life ebbed away. When the doctors announced that the duke was dead, Princess May became hysterical and her cries were heartrending. Efforts were made to lead her from the room, but for a long time nothing could induce her to leave the death chamber. She stood by the bedside, and leaning over she cried, "Eddie, my Eddie!" in agonized tones, and entreated him to speak to her once more. All the time she stood by the bedside after her lover died she kept wringing her hands in complete and utter despair, and adding by her hopeless misery to the sorrows of those whose hearts were already bowed down by the weight of the terrible affliction visited upon them.

ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY.

Efforts to be Made to Get the Primate of All England to Visit Canada.
TORONTO, Jan. 19.—The Bishop of Toronto leaves on Monday for Europe, where his lordship intends to spend a few weeks. He hopes to complete arrangements by which the archbishop of Canterbury will visit Canada in the autumn, for the purpose of attending the provincial synod, which meets in Toronto in September. Manitoba Has the Coldest Weather Ever Experienced.
WINNIPEG, Jan. 18.—Manitoba is passing through the coldest weather ever experienced here. Since New Year's the thermometer has never got above zero. Last week was very cold, the average temperature of the warmest days was 19 below zero, and of the coldest 25 below. This week opened as though it intended beating last week's record. Yesterday the mean temperature was 31 below zero and the minimum 40 below. It was 40 below this morning. The cold weather is having a depressing effect on business.

Rev. Dr. Burns to Resign.
It is reported that Rev. Dr. Burns will notify the congregation of Fort Massy church at the annual meeting tonight that he will tender his resignation of the pastorate to the presbytery of Halifax, which will meet on Tuesday next. Dr. Burns' continued ill health is the cause of this step. He is somewhat better the past few days, and there are indications of the effects of the paralysis leaving him.—Hfx. Herald.

Mr. Crabbe gave notice that at the next meeting he would move that the fees be reduced from \$5 to \$2 per annum. The amended report of the council re the tunnel was then discussed. Mr. Newson believed that the original report should be adopted accepting the smaller tunnel. He was supported by Messrs. Peske, Cotton and Higgs. Mr. P. Peake contended that Senator Howlan should be backed up in this matter. If he be left much longer in abeyance, Mr. Howlan will drop off and who else is there that would devote the time and energy and patience to the work that he has. We should strike for the eleven feet tunnel. Mr. Cotton said he had heard from Mr. Newson and others, and he felt like supporting the original report. Mr. Horace Hazard Mr. Angus and Mr. McEachern were opposed to binding the Board to any size tunnel. It was finally decided to leave the matter over to an adjourned meeting to be held next Wednesday evening, when the whole tunnel question will be discussed.

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BOARD OF TRADE

New Arrangements for the Future.

THE TUNNEL AGAIN.

The adjourned annual meeting of the Board of Trade was held Wednesday night. In the absence of President Carvell, T. Handrahah, Esq., presided. There were present Messrs. Peake, Newson, Hazard, Arnaud, Crabbe, Farquharson, McEachern, Angus, Cotton and Higgs.

Mr. Arnaud, for the committee appointed to consider the future of the Board and to nominate officers, reported as follows:—

The Committee appointed on the 13th inst., to consider the best means of carrying on the Board of Trade for the ensuing year, and to nominate officers, etc., beg to report that: Owing to the prevailing indifference regarding the future of the Board and the consequent difficulty of providing means for its maintenance upon the present system, and recognizing the importance of keeping the Corporation in existence, they recommended, as follows:—

1st. That arrangements be made forthwith to vacate the premises now occupied by the Board.

2nd. That such of the furniture as may not be required for future use be sold and the proceeds placed in the Merchants Bank of P. E. I., to the credit of the Board.

3rd. That the services of Mr. B. D. Higgs be re-engaged as Secretary, he to provide Board room in his own office, fuel and light together with his services at total cost of \$50 per annum.

The Committee further beg to nominate the following officers:—
President—L. L. Beer.
Vice-President—Patrick Blake.

The report was adopted. Some discussion followed. Mr. Farquharson approved the report and said it should have been made two years ago. Mr. Peske said there was no doubt the failure of the Board to go on as first intended was due to the indifference of the merchants of Charlottetown. Years ago when we had a Board with the advantages of affiliation with the Dominion Board and briskeer times, the Board failed for the same reason. Messrs. Crabbe and McEachern also spoke. It was the opinion, however, that the Board should serve a useful purpose under the new arrangement.

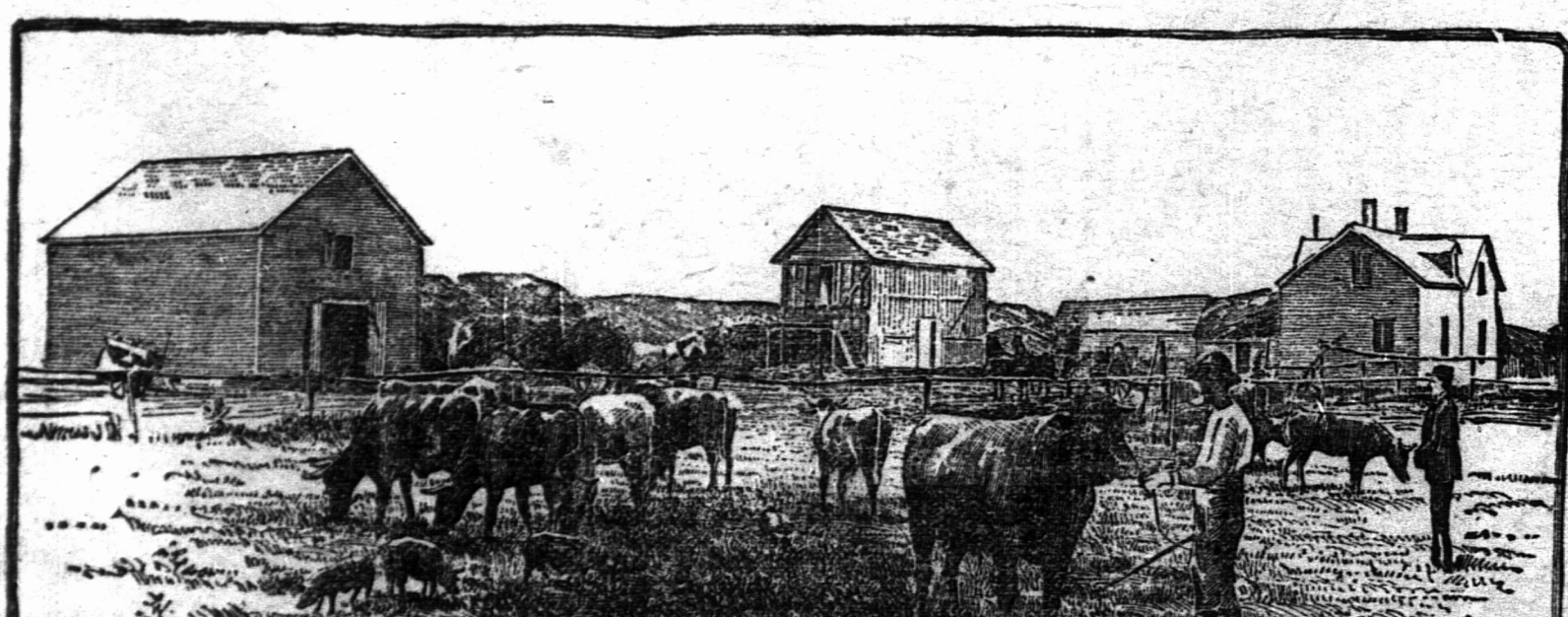
