CONGRESS TURNS DOWN Farm Debt Refinancing Bill.

(A. F. by Guardian's Special Wire) WASHINGTON, May 13.—The \$3,000,000,000 Frazier-Lemke farm debt refinancing bill, on which was based the biggest "new money" drive of the session, was crushed today under a landslide vote in the United States House of Representatives.
The 235 to 142 record ballot that killed the bill and sent lusty yells ringing through the packed House chamber witnessed battles of the 74th Congress and represented a victory for the Democratic House leadership.
Sponsors of the legislation, sent down to defeat after five years of hard work to bring the measure to vote, tried vainly to swing the tide in its favor by offering amendment after amendment designed to lure more votes. Some were accepted but did not change the final result.
One of these would have permitted loans up to no more than 80 per cent of the fair value of farms, whereas the bill originally had called for 100 per cent.

Communists Reply To Pope's Declaration

(A. F. by Guardian's Special Wire) PARIS, May 13.—The French Communist party tonight called Pope Pius' denunciation of Communism an attempt "to stop the collaboration of all men of good will."
A party statement replying to the Pontiff's declaration yesterday accused the Pope of wishing to prevent "the common work of solidarity and brotherhood."
His Holiness, inaugurating the world exposition of the Catholic press at Vatican City yesterday, declared Communism "ambushes individual dignity, the sanctity of the family order, the security of the civil consortium and, above all, religion."
He drew attention to its development in Russia, Mexico, Spain, Uruguay and Brazil.

BOY SCOUT HALL OPENED IN BORDEN

Assistant Provincial Commissioner Hallett was in charge of the Scouts outside of the hall, forming them up and leading them in the National Anthem as the Governor approached the Hall. Scoutmaster Ceretti then presented His Honour with a silver key with which to open the door, which was duly done, the Governor entering followed by the colour party, Provincial executive, Scouts, Cubs and public.

L. Mollison, Summerside, Mr. J. O. Hyndman, Charlottetown, Mr. B. R. The President briefly introduced His Honour and recalled the steps leading up to the present auspicious occasion. He congratulated Borden on its progress and enterprise, and especially in possessing such a public spirited citizen and leader as Mr. Ceretti.
The Group Charter having been unveiled, His Honour formally declared the hall opened and said:
In one of the books on Scouting written by the Chief Scout of the world, Lord Baden-Powell, the beloved founder of the Scout Movement, he quotes the great Greek philosopher Aristotle as saying that no man goeth about a more godly life than he who is concerned about the right upbringing of his own and other peoples children and, my friends, it is because one of the leading citizens of this town has been concerned and interested in the right upbringing of the boys of the Town of Borden and the surrounding country that we are assembled here this afternoon, and I would like first of all to express my very great pleasure in being with you on this occasion and to officially open this splendid new building which is to be used to strengthen and to advance the work of the Boy Scouts.

Worthwhile Effort
I heartily congratulate all those responsible for the erection of this building and I do feel that the people of this town might well congratulate themselves upon their good fortune in having in their midst a public spirited citizen of the type of Mr. Ceretti through whose efforts and unselfish service this building has been made possible. I wish to take this opportunity of publicly expressing my sincere appreciation and gratitude to Mr. Ceretti. I know of no way in which one can render higher or more acceptable service to his country than by training our boys to be good Scouts, instructing them to be honourable, friendly and clean in thought, in word, and in deed, teaching them the necessity of developing their mental and physical strength by learning to play games and by enjoying the great outdoor life instilling into the very life of the boy the great principles of Scouting as contained in the Scout Laws and Promise—
"On my honour I promise to do my duty to God and the King, to help other people at all times and to obey the Scout Laws."
That, my friends is the promise that every boy has to take before he becomes a Boy Scout and I cannot conceive of any work more worthwhile than to be instrumental in helping a boy to keep and to live up to that magnificent promise and to be a good Boy Scout.

THE DUTY OF CITIZENS

Realizing this fact, surely it is the duty of every citizen of our land to do his or her part in helping to strengthen and advance the work of this great Movement, a Movement that has won the approval and the admiration of the whole wide world.
May we in this province, do our part in helping to further the interests of this great work, being confident of this one thing that in expending time, money and effort on behalf of the Boy Scouts we are making a contribution and an investment of incalculable value to our country, our Empire and to the world at large because Scouting means sowing into the hearts of the boys of our land who will be the men of tomorrow seeds of all the worthwhile things of life—honour, loyalty, friendliness, courage, kindness, courtesy—which if nourished and cared for will produce the finest type of manhood possible and a citizenship that we will be all justly proud of.
(At the conclusion of his speech, His Honour handed Mr. Ceretti the handsome donation of \$50.00 as a contribution towards defraying the cost of the building.)
The President said that when the Executive visited Borden some time ago they learned that the Railway was charging \$10 per annum for the lot on which the hall was built, and he had taken the matter up with Mr. MacKinnon, Superintendent, who had advised him that day that the Vice-President, on account of the good work of the Boy Scouts, had reduced the rental to the nominal sum of \$1 per annum.
Field Commissioner Greenaway then read the following letter from Mr. J. A. Stiles, Executive Chief Commissioner, Ottawa:
207 Weymouth Street, Charlottetown, P. E. I.
Dear Mr. Parent:—I well remember the day Lord Baden-Powell stopped for a few minutes at Borden. The Mayor met him as he left the train and delivered a short, but excellent address of welcome. A handsome Mounted Police led us to the station platform where we saw what seemed like about 100 boys and girls lined up. They all looked clean, tidy and happy. They were in charge of a gettoman named Ceretti, to whom I spoke in Italian.
The story was told me that Mr. Ceretti was taking a keen interest in the lives of the boys and girls of Borden, in fact, was organizing a Wolf Cub Pack and a Scout Troop. It was this news which caused the Chief Scout to break his rule and to visit a place not on the regular itinerary.
Now, I hear the citizens of Borden have decided that their great asset lies in their boys and girls and have endeavored to assist Mr. Ceretti in building a Scout Headquarters. This is good news and I would like to remind the Scouts that their duty must not be abused, but must be kept clean and respectable. I once knew some Scouts who accepted a beautiful Headquarters building and afterwards seemed to forget the people who had helped them to build it. This was most unscoutlike and I am sure the Scouts of Borden will not follow their example.
The more I see of Scouting the more I am convinced that it is a great Movement deserving of our best support. It always makes me feel happy when I realize that His Honour Lt. Gov. DeBolis is himself such a good Scout, taking such an understanding and participating interest in the work and doing what he can to help. His life and his works are an inspiration to me.
May I wish the Scout Group at Borden and Mr. Ceretti the very

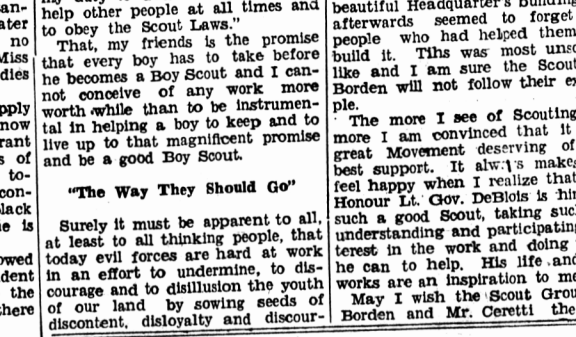

WHISKEY TAX NOT SOUGHT BY OTTAWA

OTTAWA, May 13.—The Dominion government is making no attempt to collect taxes on Canadian whiskey smuggled into the United States during the prohibition period in that country, it was learned tonight at the Department of National Revenue. As a matter of fact the Dominion government does not collect duty on goods exported.
Rum-runners on Lakes Erie and Ontario smuggled more than \$100,000,000 worth of alcoholic beverages into the United States between the time the anti-smuggling treaty between the two countries was signed in 1924 and the banning of liquor clearances for the United States by the Mackenzie King government in 1930. Later, the smugglers cleared for St. Pierre and Miquelon.
United States Treasury officials obtained permission to secure records of this traffic at Ottawa, and had been at work on the National Revenue Department books for some time when it was learned that the Canadian Parliament itself was denied this information.
The Dominion government is still awaiting the decision of the Toronto court in which Basil ("Jack") Bannister, confined in an action brought by the Dominion Distillers' Products Company of Montreal for the return of duties on spirits alleged to have been exported to the United States. The Dominion Government is resisting any attempt on the part of such companies to secure refund of duties collected from them.

Says King Will Be Crowned David II

TORONTO, May 13.—Biblical indications lead J. S. Eason, editor of the Periscope, official organ of the British-Israel-Word Federation of Canada, to the belief British kings are directly descended from Solomon and David and that King Edward VIII should be crowned David II.
"The indications are," he said tonight, "that King Edward is the Prince David mentioned in the Bible, who holds his throne in trust and will hand it over to Christ when he returns to earth to establish the Kingdom of God."
"As everyone knows, David is his household name and it is likely that by the end of May, 1937, when the coronation is due to occur, the bulk of the British people will realize that they are really the children of Israel and will probably insist that he be crowned King David. It is more than likely that the identity of the British people as modern Israel will be definitely established by the latter part of the present year."
"There are no indications in the pyramids or the Bible as to whether King Edward will marry a Jew, have children. But in any event his children would not succeed to the throne since the indications are that he is the last of the line of kings to rule before Christ takes over the throne," said Eason.

Cars Cost More As Tax Goes Up Makers Explain

WINDSOR, Ont., May 12.—(G.P.)—Discussing the effect of the Dunning budget on the automobile industry The Windsor Daily Star says:
"The price of motor cars in Canada have not gone up. But a car costs more, because the government has increased the sales tax from six to eight per cent; and there is a new excise tax of five per cent on the wholesale value of a car in excess of \$650."
"Officials of automobile companies explain that the increase on certain lower priced cars has varied from \$12 to \$17 per vehicle."
"These officials explain that they are simply tax collecting agents for the Dominion Government and they have been instructed to collect more taxes on their cars. They have to get the increased taxation from the people then turn it over to the Dominion Treasury."
"Reports from Ottawa indicate that some Liberal Members of Parliament expected the prices of cars to drop away down following the cut in the protective tariff. As explained at the time of the budget no such drop in prices was expected, and, in fact, the cost of the car to the buyer would be increased through the higher taxation."
"When the budget was announced, automobile men expressed concern about the new taxes. They feared that the public would blame the cars to the people, whereas they're keeping their prices at the same level, but have to collect more in taxes to turn over to Ottawa."
"The question of raising the sales tax was brought up in Parliament on Tuesday by Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative leader. He said that the increase would naturally mean that cars will cost more."
"The same thing applies to all goods on which there is the sales tax. They will be increased by the amount of the increased taxation. The situation is not a phenomenon peculiar to the automotive trade."
"The thing which worries the automotive manufacturers is that they fear they will be blamed for the increase in the prices of cars, when they are not doing it at all, but it is the Government's action in increasing taxes that is responsible."

Few Disorders In Greek Strike

(A. F. by Guardian's Special Wire) ATHENS, May 13.—The end of a 24-hour general sympathy strike drew near tonight with only scattered disorders reported.
Several new clashes resulted from high feeling among dockworkers at Piraeus, the port of Athens. In the capital strikers stoned street cars and smashed a few shop windows but no serious casualties were reported.
The strike called in protest against recent clashes between troops and striking tobacco workers.

Bannister Appeal Refused

OTTAWA, May 13.—Only executive clemency can prevent Arthur Bannister, 19-year old Moncton, N. B., youth paying the death penalty for his part in New Brunswick's fantastic "doll baby" murder case.
Justice Crockett of the Supreme Court of Canada today refused an application for leave to appeal on behalf of Bannister against conviction of the murder of Philip Lake.

Kasper Quads "Doing Fine"

PASSAIC, N. J., May 13.—The Kasper quadruplets, Frances, Frank, Ferdinand and Felix were "doing fine" at St. Mary's Hospital tonight.
The hospital said the weights of the four children, born last Saturday to Mrs. Emil Kasper, wife of a \$22-a-week railroad roundhouse worker, had not been checked since morning "because there was no need" for another weighing in.
The morning weight check showed three of the four had gained weight over night.

Calgary Faces Financial Crisis

CALGARY, May 13.—Calgary city officials, facing a financial crisis tonight bring default, today were confronted with a new problem.
Application was made to the Supreme Court of Alberta by a bondholder asking for an order compelling the Council to pass a by-law levying rates sufficient to provide for all "necessary expenses" including debenture obligations, this year.
On April 25, the City Council set a tax of 50 mills and budgeted for a substantial deficit. The 50-mill rate was based on plans for reducing interest charges on all outstanding city debentures to three per cent.

POSTPONE DISCUSSION ON LEAGUE

Effort by Woodsworth to Open Discussion Opposed By Major Party Leaders.
(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, May 13.—Leaders of the two major parties in the House of Commons today refused to agree to an early discussion of the League of Nations and the continuance of sanctions against Italy when J. S. Woodsworth, C.C.F. Leader, raised the question.
Prime Minister Mackenzie King suggested in view of the delicate condition of affairs in Europe a precipitate discussion of the question in the Canadian Parliament might not be the best contribution to a solution of international problems. Conservative Leader Bennett said the House should be guided by Mr. King's judgment as he received information no one else received.
Mr. Woodsworth started with a series of questions to Mr. King; when the Prime Minister said a discussion would take place later in the session Mr. Woodsworth declared this was not satisfactory and the government should take the House into its confidence at an early date.
Apparently, he said, the League of Nations was a failure. Canada should decide whether it was to continue a member of an organization which no longer offered the security desired. It should also consider its relation to Great Britain in international affairs and whether it was to be drawn into war as a result of British policy which might be a bungling policy.
Mr. King told the House he would abide by the wishes of the majority but felt the majority was in favor of careful consideration of the time at which a general League discussion should be launched.
