Ferry Rejection Seen As 'Disappointing'

BORDEN — The transportation committee of the CCF Provincial council jumped into the Vacationland argument last night with a meeting here.

The committee issued a statement expressing the disappointment of island residents that the Vacationland is not to be purchased "to provide an early solution to our transportation emergency."

The CCF statement continued: "This growing crisis was ignored so long that it seemed like a God-send that a ship suitable to our needs was actually available to meet them. Now our hopes for the security that only an extra icebreaker could give have been dashed."

The statement said: "No convincing reasons have been given for the rejection of the Vacationland, and it makes us wonder whether the interests of Canadian companies, which would profit from the construction of a new boat haven't taken priority over the urgent needs of this province."

"In view of the preposterous suggestion, endorsed by our four Conservative M.P.'s, that the Scotia the Second, be rebuilt for

the service, it is no wonder that the federal government has been indifferent to our needs.

"The fact is that, for considerable time, both the Liberal and Conservative governments have been playing politics over our transportation problem, instead of making an honest effort to have it relieved."

"For over two years the CCF has been endeavouring to impress on both the local and federal authorities the urgent need for an extra ice-breaking ferry. We shall continue to press for this solution to our immediate needs, as well as for the most practicable long-term solution, whether it be a causeway, a tunnel or a vastly improved ferry service."

Rogers, MacNeill Get Nominations

Robert Gamble, president of the Second District, presided with Keir Ramsay acting as secretary. Others nominated as councillors were Neil R. MacLeod, Summerside, Oswald Murphy, Freehold and Arnold Wood, West Cape. Mr.

Tuberculosis League; Morton Dew, president of the tuberculosis league; Garth Crockett, health educator, department of health, and Dr. W.R. Stewart, a member of the provincial Sanatorium staff.

The convention is being held all this week in Halifax at the Nova Scotia Hotel with some 250 delegates in attendance.

Dr. Found and Mr. Crockett reported on group therapy classes in sanatoria and Brig Reid spoke on rehabilitation of the tuberculosis patient in Prince Edward Island.

Mrs. MacDonald and Miss Smith reported on tuberculosis nursing in the province.
