Contract Bridge

TRUMP MANAGEMENT

Just as a declarer's most deadly weapon is often a cross-ruff, so he must try to prevent the defenders from using this same technique and making their trumps separately.

The following deal is a striking example of trump management. One declarer in a team-of-four match went down one trick at a two-heart contract, doubled, while his opposite number at the other table went down two tricks at one heart, doubled!

East dealer. North-South vulnerable.

♠ J 6 5 3
♥ A 7 4 2
♦ Q 8 6 4
♣ 10 9 8

W N E S
♥ A 4 3
♦ J 9 7
♣ A J 10 9
♠ 6 5 3

♠ K Q 7
♥ K 10 7 6 5 4
♦ K J 3 2

This was the auction at Table 1:

East	South	West	North
1♦	1♥	1♠	Pass
2♦	2♥	Double	Pass

West could have bid two no-trump over South's one heart, but he hoped that if he simply bid a spade, South would be encouraged to rebid, and then perhaps a worthwhile penalty would be gouged from the vulnerable enemy. West's hope about South's rebid was gratified, but not to his own advantage! South ruffed the opening diamond lead and led trumps at almost every opportunity, and the result was that East-West collected only six tricks, and a 200-point penalty.

At the other table West felt that it was far too optimistic to hope that South would bid twice, and so he debuffed the one-heart overall, hoping to collect 500 points, which would be more than the value of a non-vulnerable game. What's more, this bit of reasoning on West's part turned out beautifully—with the declarer's cooperation!

As before, the diamond opening was ruffed by declarer, but, evidently hoping to get in some side-suit tricks, this South led the spade king. East won and returned a diamond. South ruffed again, cashed the spade queen and tried to cash the spade jack. East ruffed and led his singleton club; West put up the ace and gave his partner a club ruff. On another diamond lead, West over-ruffed declarer and gave still another ruff. At the end, West simply handled his own trumps properly, and declarer was down two, for a 500-point penalty.
