## The National Policy Developed.

### TILLEY'S BUDGET.

#### PRINCIPAL FEATURES OF THE NEW TARIFF.

#### Cartwright Decries the Island.

Special Despatch to Examiner.

[The following despatch was—greatly to our annoyance—received on Saturday night after the EXAMINER of that day had been issued.]

OTTAWA, March 15.

The Budget Speech occupied four hours in the delivery.

The Tariff is generally acceptable to all. All duties paid on articles entering into manufactures paid back.

All duties entering into ship materials—when vessels are exported, paid back—making ship materials practically free.

Salt used in the Fisheries free, and all salt from Great Britain, free.

Molasses, from the country of production, 15 per cent. ad valorem.

Black tea, 2 cents per pound and 10 per cent. ad valorem.

Flour, 50 cents per barrel.

Cornmeal, 40 cents per barrel for protection of farmers.

Barley, 15 cents per barrel, to give home market for home productions.

Wool, 7½ per cent. per pound and 20 per cent. ad valorem.

On unenumerated, 20 per cent. ad valorem.

The free list is very large.

Duty on American pork, 2 cents per pound.

Duty on potatoes, 10 cents per bushel, to protect the farmers and meet the United States duty.

The duties on tobacco are unaltered.

The Excise on Canada twist made of Canadian grown leaf, is reduced to 4 cents per pound.

The duty on malt is reduced to 1 cent per pound.

Cartwright replied to the Budget in a long speech. He blamed Mr. Tilley for having given such good terms to P. E. Island in 1873, and said he would have refused such terms—they were too favorable.

He blamed P. E. Island for being partly the cause of his deficits.

Hon. Dr. Tupper replied in a crushing speech, and was loudly applauded.

McKenzie and Cartwright seem to take every opportunity to hurt the Island.

FURTHER PARTICULARS.

OTTAWA, March 15.

The principles adopted with regard to certain manufactures of different grades was to tax the grades that could not be made here lower. For instance, cotton wool and cotton waste would be free; grey and other grades of plain cottons, one cent per square yard, and 15 per cent. Officers would be appointed to ascertain the value of foreign goods in the markets from which they are imported, and the duties would be levied on that value. On jeans, ducks, etc., two cents per square yard and 15 per cent.; on batting, warps, etc., unbleached, two cents per pound and 15 per cent.; bleached, three cents per pound and 15 per cent.

Hosiery, 30 per cent.

Clothing, 30 per cent.

Cottons unspecified, 20 per cent.

Silks, 30 per cent.

Sole leather and moroco (rough), 10 per cent.; dressed, 15 to 25 per cent.

Earthenware, 30 per cent.

China, 20.

Plaster of Paris, 20.

Coal, anthracite and bituminous, 50 cts. per short ton. This was expected to give the Nova Scotia Coal Mines greatly increased sales.

Books, 6 cents per pound; books imported through post offices, one cent every two ounces.

Musical, six cents per pound.

Engravings, &c., 20 per cent.

Printing presses, 15 per cent.

Type, 20 per cent.; type metal, 10.

Carriages, &c., 25 per cent.

Furniture, 35 per cent.

Agricultural implements, 25 per cent.

Wooden ware, 25 per cent.

Clocks, 35 per cent.

Picture frames and moulding, 25 per cent.

Cabinet organs, specific duties of from 10 to 30 dollars, and 10 per cent.

Panofortes 25 dollars to \$50 dollars and 10 per cent.

Glass bottles 30 per cent.

Fruit jars and lamps 30 per cent.

Ornamental glass 30 per cent.

Common window glass 20 per cent.

Pig Iron \$2 per ton; Scrap \$2, bars, shears, nails, coils, 17½ per cent.; wire 25 per cent.; castings in rough, 20 per cent.; stoves 25; engines and other iron machinery, 25; iron furniture, 25; hollow iron-ware, 25.

Hardware 30 per cent.

Horse shoe nails 30 per cent.

Chain cables 5 per cent.

Anchor free.

Nails and spikes 3½ cents per pound and 10 per cent.

Sewing machines \$2 specific, and 20 per cent.

Edge tools of all kinds 30 per cent.

Yellow metal for sheathing, free.

Tinware 25 per cent.

Silver electrotype ware 30 per cent.

Watches and jewelry 20 per cent.

Wood, free.

Woolstools 7½ cents per pound, specific, and 20 per cent.

Worsted clothing 10 cents per pound, specific, and 25 per cent.

Manufactures of jute, 20 per cent.

Oil cloth, for floors, 25 per cent.

Horned cattle, horses, swine, etc., 20 per cent.

Barley, 15 cents per bushel.

Buckwheat, oats, peas, 10 cents per bushel.

Cheese, 3 cents per pound.

Wheat, 15 cents per bushel.

Rye flour, 50 cents per barrel.

Peaches, 40 cents per bushel.

Meats, fresh or salted, on actual weight as received, 1 cent per pound.

Bacon 2 cents.

Lard 1½ to 2 cents.

Seeds 15 per cent.

Seeds in papers, 25 per cent.

Vegetable, now 10 per cent, increased to 20.

Proof spirits and strong waters not sweetened or mixed, \$1.20 to 1.30 per gallon.

Brandy \$1.45.

Old Tom \$1.32½.

On Excised spirits an increase of 10 cents per gallon.

Malt reduced from 2 to 1 cent per pound.

Rum, etc., \$1.90 per gallon.

Proprietary medicines, \$1.90 per gallon.

Cheap wines, 25 cents per gallon and 30 per cent.

Champagne (quarts), \$3 per dozen and 37 per cent.

Als, beer and porter, in bottles, 13 cents per gallon; in casks, 10 cents per gallon.

Gun and sporting powder, 5 cents per pound.

Blasting powder, 3 cents.

Coal oil not changed.

Perfumery, pomatums, etc., 30 per cent.

Patent medicines in liquid form, 50 per cent.; other kinds, 25 cents.

Foreign ships seeking registry will be charged 10 per cent.

All sugar above No. 14, one cent per pound, and 35 per cent.

No sugar imported direct from West Indies to pay duty on packages, making 5 per cent. in favor of direct importation.

Molasses, 15 per cent. on direct importations, and 20 per cent. on indirect.

Coffee, no change.

Mr. Tilley claimed, in conclusion, that the Government had fulfilled their promises; had aided many important interests and injured none. Under late laws, every manufacturing enterprise would be closed in two years and the workmen emigrants. He hoped this policy would make the country great and prosperous. The estimates for 1879-80 are—

Revenue, \$24,122,000.

Expenditure, \$23,400,000.

Mr. Tilley closed at 9 p. m. The galleries were packed in the afternoon and evening.

Princess Louise was on the floor of the House in the afternoon.

Tilley was cheered constantly, and made a fine impression on all.

### EASTERN NEWS.

LONDON, March 15.

All Russian troops in Roumania have been ordered home.

Minister Layard will return as Minister to Constantinople.

General Kaufman has resigned on account of the failure of his Afghan policy.

The Russians are moving on Merv. The British will send an ultimatum to the King of Burmah, and troops will mass on the frontier next week.

Another crisis is expected in France, and Waddington's resignation is demanded.

The organic statute for Eastern Roumelia will be completed before the end of the month.

The first proposals by the Anglo-American Cable Company to the French Cable Company having been declined, new proposals have been made.

### THE WALKING WATCH.

NEW YORK, March 15.

Rowell, the Englishman, has won the walking match for the Asley Belt and the championship of the world for six days walking, covering 500 miles in 141 hours.

Ennis was second, and Harriman third. They stood at the finish: Rowell 500 miles, Ennis 475, Harriman 450. It is thought that the gate receipts will amount to \$50,000. O'Leary still very ill.
