

Fish Famine Ended; Greek Team Leads

YARMOUTH, N.S. (CP) — Three catches broke the stalemate in the international tuna cup match at nearby Wedgeport and Cape St. Mary Thursday and the Greek team took the lead with the biggest—559-pounder boat—on Soldier's Rip.

The British Caribbean team finished the day a close second on the strength of a 555-pound tuna caught at Cape St. Mary. It took Louis deVerteuil of Barbados, the Caribbean captain, three hours and five minutes to get it into the boat.

The Canadian and Mexican teams ended the third day of fishing at 111 scoreless. The match ends this afternoon.

Anderson said that for him it was the toughest fish he ever fought. He attributed most of his trouble to the fact that the leader was wrapped around the fish forcing him to work it to

ward the boat sideways. "He was never at any time more than 75 yards from the boat but coming in sideways there was absolutely nothing I could do. I'd say we had the double line out of the water for at least three hours before we finally brought him in."

The Greek catch was the only strike reported from the Wedgeport fishing grounds on Soldier's Rip and the Tusklet River. At Cape St. Mary a school of tuna was sighted playing around the boats during the afternoon but the fish eluded the anglers.

DeVerteuil said he had his bluefin within 30 feet of his boat in half an hour but the fish kept running away time after time.

"There was nothing I could do but fight him" he said. "He wouldn't give up."

He took off with the line again and again. I don't know what it is about the fish around here but they certainly know how to fight."

LIFTED GLOOM — Thursday's catches lifted the gloom that hung over tuna match headquarters after two days of fruitless effort by the 31 anglers. For the Greeks and Americans there was double satisfaction. Both teams lost fish on broken lines earlier in the match.

Weather conditions were good-bright sunshine contrasting with the fog and showers of Wednesday.

There were some anxious moments at Cape St. Mary when the U.S. and Caribbean fish were being fought in close quarters there was danger that lines from the two boats would foul each other and both fish might be lost. But skillful manoeuvring saved the day.

P.E.I. Provincial Magistrate Adjourns 5 Election Cases

Provincial Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, held court in Georgetown yesterday. The crown was represented by King's County Crown Prosecutor Gordon Tweedy.

The charges laid under the provincial election act against Laurie MacLure, Ronald Butler, Cyril Butler, Julius Neilson and William H. Burns, all represented by Frank Sigsworth were adjourned to September 29.

Mr. Sigsworth made an application to the court for adjournment stating that a petition was before the supreme court under the contraverted election act complaining of the undue election of George Ferguson and that in the petition it is alleged that persons voted illegally.

Mr. Sigsworth contended that the cases of the 5 defendants should be adjourned until after the petition was heard by the Supreme Court.

Paul Martell of Georgetown charged with assaulting James Shields of Georgetown by striking him with his fists was fined \$20 and costs.

Alfred Crane of Peakes represented by Kenneth MacDonald and charged with failing to yield at a yield sign had his case adjourned to September 29.

James Wayne Lannigan of Montague pleaded guilty to impaired driving and was fined \$100 and costs. A charge against Lannigan of causing a disturbance by shouting and swearing was withdrawn.

Edgar J. Boudreau of Georgetown who pleaded not guilty in Traffic Court to failing to stop at a stop sign had his case adjourned to August 25.

John William Hume, charged with driving without due care and attention had his case adjourned to August 25 to obtain counsel and to fix a date for trial.

Camille Edmund Lanteigne of Cardigan was found guilty of the case of Albert McCordie, Middleton, charged with obstruction of a fisheries officer in the course of his duties, was adjourned to August 23.

A motion for dismissal of the charge, made previously by George R. McMahon, representing the accused, was denied.
