Cattle Exports.

Live stock to the value of \$2,681,000 was shipped from Canada, by the St. Lawrence, to Great Britain in 1879, against 2,117,525 in 1878. This enormous increase of exportation of Canadian cattle, as compared with the previous year, shows that farmers are more alive to the importance of stock-raising and of improving the quality such as required for the English markets. The success which has thus far attended the exportation of Canadian cattle gives great encouragement for farmers to pay still more attention to stock-raising and improvement of breed.

THE ELECTION IN THE FIRST DISTRICT.—The Sheriff of Queen's County opened his nomination Court to-day for the purpose of "nominating, electing and choosing one able and discreet man for business to represent the First Electoral District of Queen's County in the Lower House of Assembly, in the place of the Honorable William Campbell, who has accepted the office of Commissioner of Public Works." At twelve o'clock the late member William Campbell was proposed by James Smith, Esq., of Lot 20, and seconded by John Sherron, Esquire, of Crapaud; Lot 29, farmer; Angus McDougall, of Lot 30, farmer; John McDougall, of Lot 30, farmer; John Campbell, of Lot 29, farmer; Robert Bruce Stewart, jr. of Lot 30, farmer; Malcolm Matheson, of 67, merchant; Anes Cash, of Lot 20, School Teacher; Oliver Wadman, of Lot 28, merchant; Duncan M. McIntyre, late of Lot 21, merchant, now of the Registry Office, Charlottetown; William Reid, jr. of Lot 29, carriage builder; Archibald Shaw, of Crapaud; Lot 29, accountant; Robert Rogerson, of the same place, farmer; Donald W. Palmer, of Victoria, Lot 29, merchant; James A. Howatt, of the same place, farmer; Duncan McDonald, of Lot 30, farmer, and James Gass, of Lot 30, farmer. At four o'clock p. m., no other candidate having offered, the Sheriff closed his Court, and returned the Hon. William Campbell, as duly elected by acclamation.

DIPHTHERIA—the dread disease—entered the family of Mr. William Dingwell, of this city, and has carried off three children. One of Mr. Dingwell's children, ten years of age, died of the disease about a fortnight ago. Others of the family contracted it, and two of them—one a girl of fifteen years and the other a boy of eight—succumbed to its terrible effects, yesterday. We tender Mr. Dingwell and family our sympathy in their sad bereavement.

ACCOUNTS of the most distressing character come from the Turkish Provinces both in Europe and Asia. The bonds of society seem to have been dissolved. Law and justice are set at defiance. Security for life and property there is none; and famine and pestilence are busy. An appeal signed by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Lord Shaftsbury and others is published, asking aid for the famine districts in Armenia and Turkestan. The famine extends over 100,000 square miles.

ON ST. PATRICK'S NIGHT an excellent musical and literary entertainment was given in the Town Hall, Georgetown. A leading feature of it was an address on "Music" given by Rev. Dr. McDonald. By the entertainment the sum of \$41 was realized.

ELDER D. CRAWFORD will (D. V.) preach in the Christian Meeting House, Upper Great George Street, to-morrow, 21st. Morning and evening. Evening subject—"Election"—as treated in the 9th of Romans.

IN THE trotting match to-day, on Hillsborough ice, between P. S. Brown's "Long John" and L. Hooper's "Zulu," for \$40 a side, the first named horse won easily in three straight heats.

THE "Northern Light" landed the remainder of her passengers at Burnt Point yesterday. She has not reached Georgetown yet.

THE Socialists held a meeting in Chicago on the 16th and heard addresses on the Chinese question and adopted ultra resolutions against immigration. They formulated petitions to the City Council to quarantine against the Chinese and threatened dire things in case they came to Chicago in any numbers.

IN view of the expected unparalleled exodus of emigrants from Great Britain, which is looked for this year, some private capitalists in London have it under contemplation to fit the "Great Eastern" for trips to the United States and Canada at cheap rates. It is thought if she were fitted up for steerage passengers, she could bring back cattle, etc.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, March 19.
The House opened at 3 p. m. In answer to an enquiry as to the disposal of the sum voted for Irish Relief, Sir S. L. Tilley said the Government had received a cablegram, asking which fund they wished the money to go to, and had replied to divide it between the Mansion House and the Duchess of Marlborough's.

Several petitions against the Deceased Wife's Sister Bill, from Nova Scotia and P. E. Island were presented.

Among the petitions was one against the draw-bridge at Woodstock, presented by Mr. Connell, and signed by G. L. Trusdale, N. Hutchinson, W. A. Smith, Geo. R. Burt, Joseph McGee, and three hundred and fifty-seven others.

Mr. Weldon, St. John, delivered his speech on the Budget dealing with the stock arguments that have been doing duty until they are worn out.

Mr. Doull depicted the sectionalism which predominated in the previous speaker's remarks. He praised the Government for its policy. He did not feel fully satisfied with the policy in all respects, yet he recognized the difficulties in the way of the Government. He doubted, if there had been a duty on coal, whether the sales would have been one half what they were. The prospects for the incoming season were very good, and he had every reason to expect that a very large increase in the trade would be experienced. As one interested in shipping, he thought the National Policy had operated beneficially. He said that, as far as he had been able to discover, the state of trade and commerce throughout the country was good. He was satisfied that trade was reviving, and that the incoming season would be a good one.

After some remarks from Bourbeau in French, Robertson, of Hamilton, proceeded to discuss the National Policy, showing, among other things, that the Grits in the Ontario local elections shirked the National Policy issue, and refused to run their elections on federal issues. It being six o'clock, the Speaker left the Chair.

Private Bills were read a second time, among them the Bell Telephone Company's Bill, as amended by the exertions of Messrs. Donville, Daly and Richey, so as to give City Councils sufficient power over the company in placing their posts through cities.

Robertson resumed the debate on the Budget, and gave numerous instances showing how the manufacturers of the city of Hamilton had been developed into vigorous life under the National Policy.

Casey followed, stating instances in which he said the National Policy had not worked well.

LONDON, March 19.

In the Liverpool Spring Cup race yesterday, Lorillard's "Parole" came in first, Machells' Advance second; Parole, however, was disqualified, on the ground of a cross, and the race awarded to Machell's Advance.

The London Daily News says it admits that Conservatives will lose ten seats in Scotland, and expect to lose seven of the English and Welsh seats in the North of Ireland.

The Central News Association reports that it has received a communication from Hartmann acknowledging that he was chosen by the Nihilists to assassinate the Czar, and giving a detailed account of his attempt at Moscow. Hartmann concludes by saying that he intends to emigrate to America in a few days.

The anniversary of the commune was celebrated on Thursday by the Revolutionary party with several banquets.

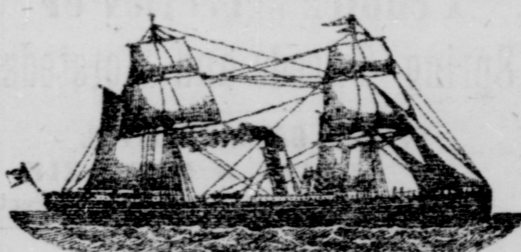
