While other Canadian farmers prepare for spring planting, two brothers in this community 10 miles from Chatham are harvesting their winter rhubarb crop.

Thomas and Duncan Broadwood operate one of the few rhubarb farms in Canada. Their main competition is from United States growers.

The rhubarb was planted in open fields last fall. Later the roots were brought into a big barn, planted in two tiers of deep flats and frozen.

Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Agriculture, in his remarks, stated he was of the opinion that although the amount of wool handled by the Association had been very small it certainly had a definite influence on the price paid on the island.

Mr. W.R. Shaw spoke to the meeting and stated that in his opinion the handling of wool through the Sheep Breeders' Association on behalf of the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers had a great deal to do with the price received by the producer, and he felt that the Association should make every effort possible to set up a wool marketing agency that would be workable.

Mr. Allan O'Brien, assistant general manager of the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers, stated that growers across Canada had, in the last thirty-eight years, built efficient machinery, facilities and experienced personnel to handle the Canadian wool clip.

Mr. Reid Underhay gave a report of the meeting of the Canadian Sheep Breeders Association which was held in Brandon, Manitoba, of which he is the Maritime director.

The officers for the coming year are: president, Mr. Hudson Pridham; vice-president, Irving Haslam; secretary, C.A. Paynter, (re-elected). The following directors were re-elected: Henry Wedge; Ernest Underhay, Kings; Mr. John Thompson, of the Association to the Federation of Agriculture, and Reid Underhay and Alex Hamilton were appointed as representatives to the Royal Winter Fair.

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Roll call was answered with a verse of scripture, and 14 members were present. Florence Macdonald offered to be worship leader at the next meeting. After a very enjoyable hymn sing, the meeting closed by repeating the Lord's Prayer.

Sheep Breeders Discuss Wool Marketing Agency

The possibility of setting up a wool marketing agency was discussed at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Sheep Breeders Association held in the Legion Hall yesterday with the president, Mr. Irving Haslam in the chair.

At a previous meeting of the directors they decided that the necessary costs of marketing wool through the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers' Association was more than the returns, and it was decided to discontinue this phase of operation until more wool could be had and so be able to defray the operating expenses.

His report, the president, Mr. Haslam, while making the above statement, said also that although the amount of wool handled through the Association was very small the average price paid was quite satisfactory.

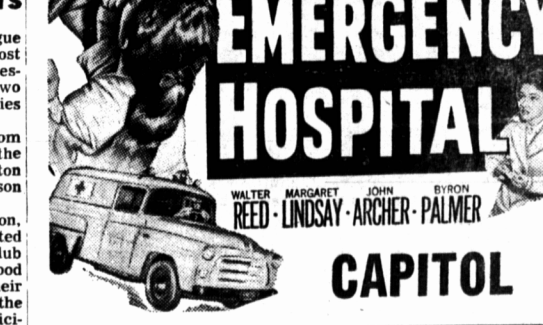

HAMILTON (CP) — Walter R. Rolfe, the first minister of labor and health in the Ontario legislature under the regime of premier E. C. Drury in 1919, died Tuesday.

Mr. Rolfe was elected member for Hamilton West when the Farmer-Labor party was elected. He remained minister of labor and health until 1924.
