The shipping season having commenced, it is to be hoped that our Colonial Governments will afford shippers every facility necessary to develop the trade of our country, as it is from this department we derive a large part of our Colonial revenues.

They export annually large quantities of lumber and other products, and yet masters of vessels arriving at that Port are obliged to travel twenty or thirty miles to enter or clear their vessels. Indeed, if they were constituted a port of entry for British and foreign goods, our authorities would be saved much trouble in paying drawbacks, &c., and the merchants at Bay Verte would save much time and expense in importing their goods.

Negligence on the part of Government in not affording the necessary facilities for trade retards the progress of the country.—Com on DIT.

The Dublin Evening Mail, the leading Irish Conservative journal, speaking of Mr McGee's recent pamphlet on "Federal Governments, Past and Present," says:—

In furtherance of the scheme for the Confederation of the British Provinces of North America, lately so felicitously introduced by Lord Monck, Mr. McGee has published the pamphlet now under notice, in which he has indicated the course to be pursued by the British North Americans, the few pages of these notes on Federal Governments appear to us to contain quite a sufficient store. Before stating the conclusion at which the author arrives, we give our passage which is a good sample of the clearness and force of his style, and, as it contains a special illustration of his equality as a statesman. (Here follows the passage referred to.)

NEWFOUNDLAND.

The steamer Merina, arrived at Halifax from St. John's, Newfoundland, on the afternoon of the 23d April.

The most interesting intelligence from this quarter is the formation of a new Government consequent upon the elevation of Attorney General Hoyle to the Chief Justiceship, vacated by Sir Francis Brady. The Hon. F. B. Carter, one of the gentlemen representing Newfoundland at the Confederation Conference, held at Quebec, has been appointed Attorney General, and Ambrrose, Esq., his co-delegate, has entered the Ministry, and accepts the Premiership. The Courier gives the following as the new Government:—

Mr. Ambrrose, Premier, without office. Mr. F. B. Carter, Attorney General. Mr. Bemister, Colonial Secretary. Mr. Kent, Receiver General. Mr. E. D. Shea, Financial Secretary, without a seat in the Council.

The Hon. Lawrence O'Brien retains his position as Senior member and President of the Executive Council in the absence of the Governor. Capt. Carter and Mr. Stabb also retain their seats in the Council without office.

The Courier, (Conservative organ), has reason to believe that the arrangements will be made with respect and confidence of the most influential men of all classes.

Between the 1st and 15th inst. there were seven arrivals from the ice, bringing in the aggregate 31,153 seals, of which 10,000 were of the species known as Hooded, 5,000 of which number 1881 were old seals; the steamer Wolf, 2,500; the schooner Eliza, 3,100; the Superior, 2,000; the Scotia, 2,000; and the Susan, 5,600; the latter reports a number of vessels with good seals, and the steamer Ariel, which arrived at St. John's on the 8th inst. from the Westward, reports favorably of the fishery in the Channel and its vicinity.

The Harbour Grace Standard says that the destruction of sheep and other animals by the worthless and starving dogs which are allowed to prowl about the streets, is still going on from day to day.

It is stated that in Carboneau the dogs are not only killing horses and cows, but actually devouring their own species. They are even attacking and worrying human beings, a fine little girl having been mangled in a shocking manner, her face and neck being cut off.

The Legislature of the Island passed a bill to provide for the destruction of dogs. The law makes it imperative on Constables to destroy all dogs found at large.

The Legislature of the Island was prorogued by His Excellency the Governor on the 25th inst. His speech the Governor thus referred to the prospects of the seal fishery:—

"Although the result of the seal fishery is not fully known, the success enjoyed by some vessels which have already returned justifies the belief that the season may be considered upon a fairly profitable account in this branch of our local industry."

"The mildness of the winter, and the apparent promise of a fine and early spring, would seem to give us hopes for an equally successful cod fishery."
