AGRICULTURE

Mr. Cullen said that before the summer was over there would be a complete inoculation service to the whole cattle population of the Island, for TB and Bangs Disease. He reported that the inoculations had already been carried out in Kings County. The service is being provided by the Federal Government with the assistance of a Provincial Veterinarian.

"The number of cattle that is raised is governed by the amount of grass that can be produced," said Mr. Cullen. He made reference to the soil analysis survey that had been conducted by Mr. Whiteside, of the Experimental Farm, which showed that some areas of the Island were not suited for agriculture. He cautioned against the growing of too much grain which he said would eventually result in serious depletion of soil vitamins.

"Farming today is a business and more people are finding out that the books won't balance unless they can produce in sufficient amounts to make it pay," he said.

POTATOES
The Minister noted that potato production in the Province continues at a high level. He said that a disease outbreak in the crop this year had threatened serious damage and that legislation

relative to plant and disease eradication would be coming up before the session came to an end.

He said that Island potatoes continue to demand a premium over other potatoes on the Montreal and Toronto market. The average price to the Island grower since the first of December, he said was 56 cents per bushel—an amount which he considered below the cost of production.

Speaking of the recent meeting between members of the potato industry and members of the Federal Government regarding the tariff question, Mr. Cullen said that all of the members were sworn to secrecy because they did not wish to supply the U. S. government with information which might prove valuable in thwarting any move that might be made.

SMALL FRUITS AND VEGETABLES
"Small fruits and vegetables are being produced in quantities that were never known before," said a cash crop that was bringing considerable income to many Island farmers. Among the crops in this category, Mr. Cullen named strawberries, cucumbers, peas and beans.

Mr. Cullen said that a great deal of the marginal soil in the Province was being used for the growing of blueberries and an experiment being conducted at Allison and Blooming point was proving quite successful. He expressed the hope that other areas not suitable for ordinary crops would be so used.

Many will condemn the potato for depleting the Island soil, but the Minister pointed out that the large number of well kept Island farm homes indicated that the money must have come from somewhere. "I think that many of them must have made it from potatoes," he said.

PLENTY OF ISLAND PRODUCTS
"It was very sorry to hear the Opposition leader say that he could find very few Island products on the shelves of the Co-op Super Market," said Mr. Cullen who at this time produced a large carton from which he took potato chips from Souris; apples from the orchard of Mr. M. F. Reeves; T-ste Sea filets processed in Souris; Blue Berries and Strawberries grown on the Island; Evaporated Milk processed by Perfection Creameries, beans and peas from Bedouque; canned mackerel and fish oil from Souris.

"It is interesting to note," said Mr. Cullen, "that most of these products were made possible through the help of the Industrial Promotional Act." He announced that a New Brunswick firm manufacturing St. Croix Valley products had a representative on the Island a few weeks ago and had contracted for the growing of 350 acres of yellow eyed beans.

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
