FACTS FOR FARMERS

Cattle Management Keeps Herd Healthy

One of the neglected problems this time of year is external parasites or lice. The cattle and especially the young cattle and calves have been out on pasture all summer and not handled closely. These animals can build up a very heavy load of lice and become anemic and unthrifty and subject to other diseases. I have been told by your veterinary practitioners they are receiving calls for young animals and finding the only problem present a heavy infestation of lice. People seem to have a false idea that lice is only a barn problem. This is not true. It is an animal problem and goes with the animals not with the stabling. It is a very real problem all times of year but especially now because these animals have not been handled or observed closely for quite a period of time.

Trust Fathers Mystified

A reported decision of the federal government to guarantee only part of the operating and maintenance costs of the Confederation Centre, has the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Trust somewhat mystified.

"In this case, half a loaf does not solve the problem," the Trust statement said, "because it costs a certain amount of money just to keep the doors open." "In all our negotiations with Ottawa over the past months we have been using a minimal budgetary figure as a basis, and this figure has been accepted as realistic."

Trust Fathers Mystified

"Up to yesterday the Trust has been led to believe that the decision of cabinet would be on the basis of total support of the Trust's submission.

"All our negotiations with the federal government have been based on the proposition that it is the representative body of all Canadians, and it therefore should pay the major share of the annual operating and maintenance budget."

"For the federal government to now offer to pay less than the figure used in the negotiations and ask the premier of the province to find the rest is not really a solution to the Centre's financial dilemma."

UNDER FEEDING

Underfeeding is also a common finding. Our cattle are turned to pasture in May and get lush pasture and grow and put on flesh during June and July. But we are all guilty of not supplementing our pastures in time to prevent a weight loss during the fall season. This is a hidden expense. That is, we did not see it go into our pocketbooks and therefore we do not see it go out, but it is a real factor in limiting our profits.

UNDERFEEDING

Underfeeding and the loss occurring from it is a hereditary problem. Our grandfathers did it this way therefore it is good enough for me. I do not suggest farmers feed their present stored feed to overcome this situation today and then have their animals starve before they get to pasture next spring, but I would strongly recommend that this condition be seriously considered and that feed and supplemental feeding be supplies for next year. This is a large complex problem and should be planned at least a year in advance but the complete program on your premises may have to be planned now for three years in advance. Loss of production during the fall (and I am using production for milk or cream or meat products) and mean the difference between success and failure and as years go past efficiency becomes more and more important.

These are only a few of the most important hidden profit robbers with reference to herd health that should be brought to your attention.
