Rain Cheers U.S. Drought Area

NEW YORK (AP) — Crop-releasing rain and forecasts of more of the same this week gave encouragement Monday to many farmers in the drought-stricken northeast United States. A million-dollar cloudburst dumped more than an inch of rain on eastern Long Island, saving parched crops there. The 45-minute downpour reduced to a minimum the need for further irrigation, a farmers' spokesman said. Elsewhere in New York state, torrential rains eased the drought in the northern Hudson valley, but the crop situation remained critical in lower Hudson valley. Some sections of the state will get an additional half-inch of rain by Saturday, and other localities will get much more, the U.S. weather bureau said. Massachusetts meteorologists also predicted a half-inch of rain during the week. Sixteen cloud-seeding machines were sent out with the hope of supplementing the predicted rainfall. North Brookfield later reported a light, steady rainfall that was believed to be following a path set up by cloud seeding. LOT OF RAIN The state department of agriculture reported "a lot of rain" in the central part of Massachusetts, but severe drought conditions prevailed in the southeastern sections. Connecticut farmers sought additional relief through an emergency irrigation system set up with civil defense equipment. Governor Abraham Ribicoff received permission Sunday to employ the pumps, generators and 10 miles of pipe. Connecticut already has an emergency system to carry water in the eastern part of the state. In New Hampshire, weekend showers and additional rain Monday were considered "sufficient precipitation to relieve the immediate high forest fire hazard." More showers were forecast. Governor Lane Dwinell lifted a five-day ban on smoking and open fires in woodlands of five southern counties.

Addresses Rotarians On Epidemics Of Hysteria

"An idea can be pathogenic in the same way that a germ can be," Dr. R.C.A. Hunter, a member of the teaching staff at McGill University said in an address before the Rotary Club at their weekly luncheon meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday. Dr. Owen Curtis, Deputy Minister of Health was chairman. Speaking on the subject "Mental Epidemics," Dr. Hunter continued, "It can be introduced into a more or less susceptible community, strike down increasing numbers of people, reach a peak incidence and then gradually disappear, just as may, say the polio virus, tuberculosis bacillus or any virus which cause epidemics." As an outstanding example of developed abnormal conduct, Dr. Hunter traced the drift of the Sale Witch Hunt starting with the charge of witchcraft against a young girl in Boston and the development of a community mental upset which only terminated after twenty persons had been burned at the stake. The surge of remorse which followed throughout the area, was equally pronounced, Dr. Hunter said. Other examples of hysterical epidemics were cited which however indicated a lessening of the unstable state of communities. He mentioned "Rock'n Roll" and other "crazes" in a lesser degree as mental epidemics. "My personal opinion is that women's fashions, and the increasing number of men who tend to conform to standard fashions, the freakish development in motor cars, without apparently improving the products, all tend to indicate a stirring up in our communities, brought about in a variety of ways," Dr. Hunter said. The speaker was thanked by Dr. W.P. MacMillan, who recalled briefly his student days at McGill and the great forward strides in the study of Psychiatry in recent years. Dr. Hunter was born in Jamaica, B.W.I. and came to Canada in 1939, joining the RCAP in that year. He graduated from McGill in 1945. He graduated from McGill in 1950 with the M.D. degree and furthered his work in psychiatry at Allan Memorial Institute in Montreal until 1953. For the next two years Dr. Hunter studied at the University of London, Maudsley Hospital and in 1955 he joined the staff of Royal Victoria Hospital, Allan Memorial Institute and the teaching staff of McGill University. He is presently enjoying a vacation on the Island. MONTREAL (CP) — John W. Demco, general superintendent of CNR at North Bay, Ont., has been appointed general superintendent of the newly-created Maritime district, Stanley F. Dingle, president of operation announced Monday. Mr. Dingle also announced the appointment of Ernest J. Cooke as manager and general superintendent of the Newfoundland district, which includes Newfoundland and Labrador. Mr. Demco, in heading the Maritime district, will be in charge of the main line and Prince Edward Island sections of the Atlantic region. He has served with the CNR in London, Ont., Toronto, Hornepayne and Montreal. Mr. Cooke was formerly manager of the Newfoundland district. He joined the CNR at Winnipeg in 1924 and was made assistant general superintendent of car equipment for the central region in 1925 before his first appointment in Newfoundland.

B. C. MONSTER SWIMS AGAIN

KELOWNA, B.C. (CP) — Ogo-pogo, the elusive whatchamacallit that inhabits Lake Okanagan, was reported seen Monday by a group of people who made six adults and two children with monsters before their eyes in less than 24 hours. Phil Baron, a Kelowna garage mechanic, and Mr. and Mrs. Fred Welling, Baron's visitors from Vancouver, spotted Ogo-pogo just north of the city. The fabled monster put on a spectacular display for what was only his second appearance this season. "First, said Baron, there was 'something like a whirlpool' about a quarter-mile from shore. 'Suddenly there were white caps. The humps appeared. He was about 30 feet long.' Confiding that he had always spoofed at Ogo-pogo's existence before, Baron reported a change of heart. "Seeing is believing," he said. Mr. and Mrs. Welling confirmed Baron's story down to the last detail. In his first appearance this year, Ogo-pogo showed off six of his humps to Vivian, 11, and John, 8, children of Mrs. Taeko Ozaki of Rutland, B.C., Sunday night. By the time Mrs. Ozaki, her mother and her sister had arrived on the scene, only four humps were visible. But, as if to compensate for this comparatively unimpressive display, Ogo-pogo "was making a low guttural noise" as he disappeared into the lake, Mrs. Ozaki said. No one has yet been able to explain who or what Ogo-pogo is, although there has been no shortage of speculation over the years. Merchants in the Okanagan valley, their cash registers ringing up sales from tourists attracted by Ogo-pogo, have kept discreetly mum. Notwithstanding, there's a \$5,000 reward out for anyone with an authentic picture of the monster.

Electric Fence In Revolt Area

ALGIERS (AP) — France is building a new electrified line of defence in eastern Algeria and has set up a new operational command for the southern part of the country in fresh efforts to cope with the nationalist rebellion. The new strategy was shaped to face two disquieting developments in the warfare which began 32 months ago: 1. A stepped-up flow of rebel arms across the Tunisian border and the use of Tunisian soil as a refuge and jumping-off point for rebel attacks. 2. The spread of rebel operations southward into the Sahara toward the areas where French drilling crews have brought in oil wells indicating large reservoirs of rich crude. The new line of defence, consisting of electrified barbed wire and lookout posts, is being laid out well inside Algerian territory. Defence Minister Andre Morice says this does not mean France is ceding any territory to the rebels, or creating a no-man's land between Algeria and the Tunisian frontier.

Britain Steps Up Air Attacks

By ROSS BIRTWISTLE SHARJAH, Arabia's Trucial Coast (Reuters) — Britain stepped up its aerial attack Monday against Oman's rebellious tribal leader and moved troops within striking distance of rebel headquarters. The warfare involves Sheikh Ghalib bin Ali, the Imam of Oman, a religious-political leader, and Said bin Taimur, pro-British sultan of the independent kingdom of Muscat and Oman. RAF jet fighters attacked a rebel-held fort at Birkat, a small Arab village in the centre of the mountainous terrain of Oman. The military objective was a mud-walled fortress with two watch-towers. Moderates Hail Argentine Win

BUENOS AIRES (AP) — Moderates forces backing constitutional reform for Argentina hailed down 20 seats in the new constituent assembly Monday. They need only 11 more to clinch control. The divided, mostly pro-Peron opposition had 49 seats as counting of ballots from Sunday's election proceeded under a complicated system of proportional representation. Some 500,000 ballots remain to be counted. Popular-Radical leader Ricardo Balbin, an old foe of ex-dictator Juan D. Peron, claimed a complete victory for the constitutional reformists over the anti-reform parties led by Nationalist Arturo Frondisi, who pleaded during the campaign for Peronist votes. While Peronists were banned as candidates, the ex-dictator piled up more than 1,500,000 blank votes. Manoeuvring from exile in Venezuela, Peron called on his faithful to give him a moral victory by casting blank ballots. He boasted a few days ago that he would receive 5,000,000 votes.
