Churchill Made Request For Burial At Blenheim

LONDON (CP)—Sir Winston Churchill remarked one day: "At Blenheim I took two very important decisions. To be born, and to marry."
"I am happily content with the decisions I took on those occasions."
Sir Winston didn't mention still another decision he had made to return to Blenheim Palace—or, more precisely, the adjoining churchyard at St. Martin's, Bladon—as his last resting place.

Veteran Airman Dies In London

LONDON (CP)—Air Chief Marshal Sir Philip Joubert de la Ferie, officer commanding the Royal Air Force coastal command between 1941 and 1943, died Thursday in a London hospital. He was 72.
Joubert de la Ferie, also served as an inspector-general of the RAF and deputy chief of staff for information and civil affairs in the Second World War. Prior to the war, he was air officer commanding the RAF in India.

Two Sisters Committed For Trial

MONTREAL (CP)—Two sisters have been committed to trial by Judge Richmond Roche on charges of being accessories after the fact of murder in the fatal beating last summer of Margot Turner, 37, a former night club dancer.
Carmen Mathieu, 35, and her 18-year-old sister Mabel were ordered held without bail. No trial date was given.

Eskimos Safe From Intake Of Radiation

OTTAWA (CP)—The amount of cesium-137 absorbed by caribou - eating Canadian Eskimos as the result of radioactive fallout still is well below the danger level, the federal health department reported Thursday.
A report by the department's radiation protection division said the average cesium-137 levels in 1964 are "generally somewhat higher" in northern Canada than those found in 1963.

had been building when the plans came and she made it back to the palace—but only just. She didn't reach a bedroom:
WAS HEIR TO DUKEDOM
As a boy Winston was heir-presumptive to the dukedom—and hence to Blenheim—and is cousin of the present owner.
Here is how the Marlborough succession has worked out in modern times:
Wins' on Churchill, born 1874 to Lord Randolph, brother of the eighth duke, was heir-presumptive until aged 23.
At that time, in 1899, a son was born to the ninth duke and his American millionaire wife, Consuelo Vanderbilt, and he succeeded to the title in 1904, superseding Winston's place in the line of succession. He is the present title-holder and answers to the resounding name of John Albert Edward William Spencer Churchill, lieutenant-colonel life guards retired, former mayor of Woodstock.
It is reported that after Consuelo's marriage she was urged repeatedly by her English mother-in-law to have a child, a son, promptly before "that upstart Winston" would succeed to the dukedom.

The visitor may be surprised to find that Sir Winston was born in a poky little room that once served as a cloakroom near the palace entrance. It contains such things as his baby clothes and a lock of his hair.
Winston's mother, the vivacious American Jennie Jerome, wife of Lord Randolph Churchill, gardens were designed by Lancelot Brown, is through a triumphal arch leading to a bridge over a river feeding a 13-acre artificial lake, the palace sprawling in lazy splendor on the opposite hill.

The present duke, the 10th, opened the palace to the public in 1950 and since then many hundreds of thousands have visited the magnificent place for a nominal fee.
