

New Agreement On Cars Is Called Canadian Piracy

WASHINGTON (CP)—The Canadian-United States automotive agreement was criticized here as Canadian piracy of American production and jobs.

Canadian efforts to boost output in its auto industry—only twenty-fifth of that in the U.S.—constitutes a cunningly disguised raid on the U.S. market to be accomplished by employment of undeniably unfair means.

Washington lawyer Alfred R. McCauley told the ways and means committee of the House of Representatives.

"Canada is after U.S. production and does not care how this piracy is accomplished," he said.

He also suggested, under questioning by Republican John Byrnes of Wisconsin, Canada is so bound by the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade in effect it would have to live with its big auto trade deficit with the U.S. if there were no U.S.-Canada agreement.

Any unilateral action by Canada to raise its tariffs or otherwise make it more difficult for the U.S. to sell in Canada might make Canada liable to U.S. claims for compensation, he said.

McCauley was testifying on behalf of the industrial committee of Paducah, Ky., which he said is an organization concerned with the industrial welfare of the community. He said it opposes on various grounds the Canada-U.S. agreement which would abolish tariffs at the manufacturer level for most north American motor vehicles and their original parts.

40 Not Too Old For Civil Service

OTTAWA (CP)—Is 40 too old to start a new job? Not in the federal civil service.

The civil service commission, the government recruiting agency, says one quarter of the 17,369 employees hired in 1964 are more than 40 years old.

Such people are valuable, the commission says, because of the experience, stability and maturity they bring to their jobs.

Of the 4,596 who were more than 40 years old, 3,346 were between 41 and 50, 1,174 were between 51 and 60, and 76 were more than 60 years old.

PARENTS ESCAPE
WELLSBORO, Pa. (AP) — Five children were killed early Tuesday in a fire that destroyed their home near this north central Pennsylvania community. Tioga County coroner Dr. Harry Williams said the victims, ranging in age from two to 10, were the children of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Boyce. The parents evidently leaped to safety as flames raced through their two-story cinder-block home.

East German Claims Damages From West Zone

BERLIN (Reuters) — East German leader Walter Ulbricht in a speech published here claimed 120,000,000 marks (\$30,000,000,000) damages from West Germany—some of it to compensate for East Germans who fled west.

Ulbricht made the demand in a

speech to the central committee of the ruling Socialist Unity (Communist) party last weekend.

He said the sum—calculated for the period between 1950 and 1961, when the Communist wall was erected in Berlin—included reparations paid by East Germany "for the whole of Germany" and the effect of the "economic cold war" which he said West Germany had waged against East Germany.

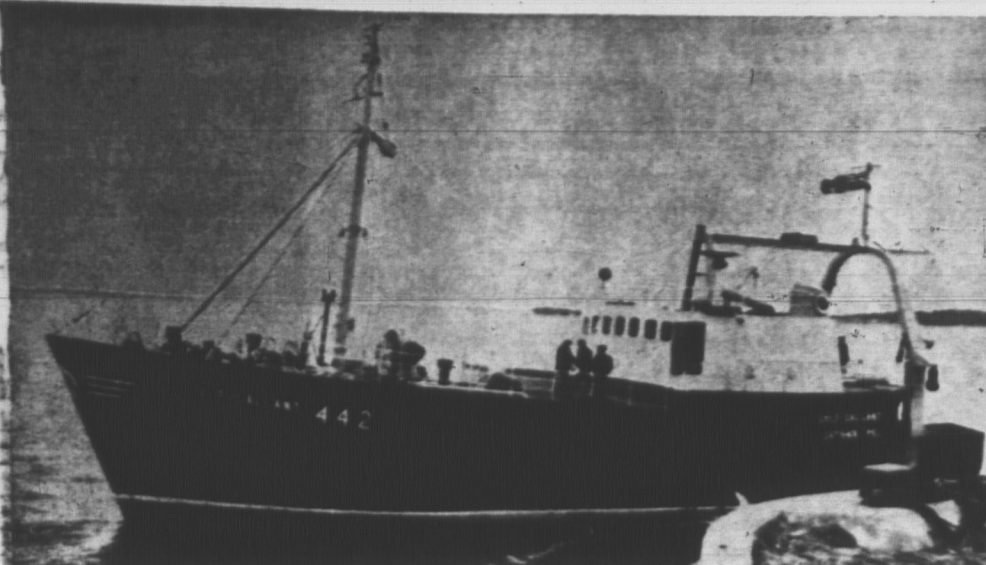
Ulbricht did not speak directly of refugees but referred to the

cost to East Germany of educating and training personnel later "recruited" by West Germany.

West German official figures say about 2,500,000 people fled from East Germany between 1950 and 1961.

Western observers said Ulbricht's demand was unlikely to be taken seriously by West Germany.

Winters Blasts Retention Of Tax On Power Companies

MONTREAL (CP)—Robert H. Winters, chairman of British Newfoundland Corporation (Brinco), criticized Finance Minister Gordon for not removing the corporation income tax on privately-owned power operations in Montreal's federal budget.

He said in a statement the tax is "an obstacle" in the way of agreement between Brinco and the Quebec government for sale and transmission of Churchill (formerly Hamilton) Falls Power.

"It is a matter of regret that Monday's budget did not put Brinco on the same footing as publicly-owned power," said Mr. Winters. "This matter is being pursued."

The Brinco chairman termed "constructive" his April 24 meeting with Premier Lesage of Quebec in Toronto and said his company is analyzing various cost factors to be submitted to Quebec Hydro as agreed during these discussions.

This seemed a more optimistic report on the Toronto meeting than was provided by Mr. Lesage.

issued through Brinco's Montreal office, called on all sides to join together to remove any obstacles in the path of development of Churchill Falls.

CALL TO CO-OPERATE
"This development is a great project of national significance—perhaps the largest on the continent and one of the greatest ever conceived in Canada," he said. "It is important that all who are concerned with it approach it on the basis of the opportunities it presents and concentrate on removing whatever obstacles there may be."

Brinco intends to act accordingly.

Premier Lesage repeated in the Quebec legislature Wednesday that his meeting with Mr. Winters produced no concrete results. He said they had agreed only that Brinco should submit some estimates to Quebec Hydro.

Mr. Lesage, questioned by Opposition leader Johnson, added that he had no plans to meet with Premier Smallwood of Newfoundland over the issue.

New Treatment Protects Rats From Radiation

MOSCOW (Reuters) — While mice and rats treated by Soviet scientists with a protective preparation survived a normally fatal dose of radiation on a simulated moon flight, Tass news agency has reported.

The scientists at the Biophysics Institute re-created a solar flare—the most dangerous radiation situation cosmonauts might encounter on a trip to, around and back from the moon—it said.

The protective preparation sharply eased the effect on the test animals of the lethal radiation through which their ship passed for 24 hours.

SCIENTISTS SEEK MOA

CHRISTCHURCH, N.Z. (AP) — The ostrich-like moa may be dead as the dodo, but New Zealanders are keeping their eyes peeled just in case. The great wingless bird is thought to have become extinct centuries ago, but doubtful sightings are reported from time to time. Scientists recently failed to find any on a remote island, but surviving moas might still be living in unexplored forests.

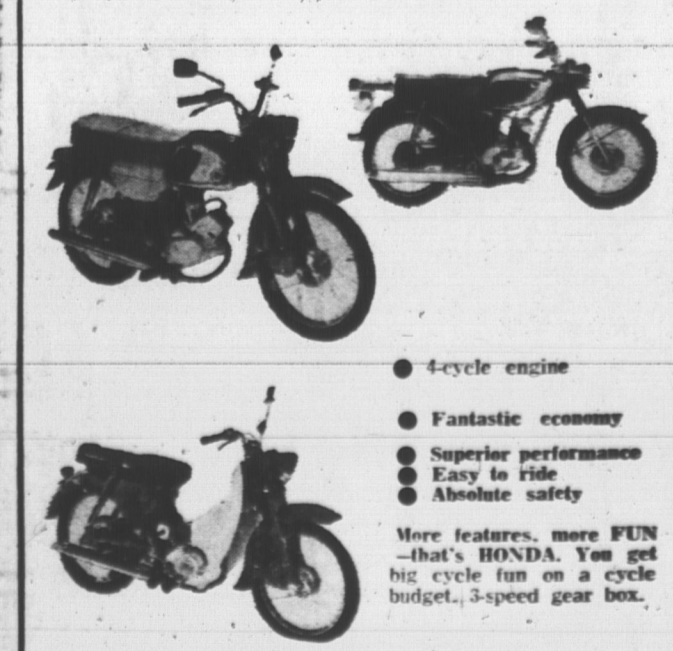

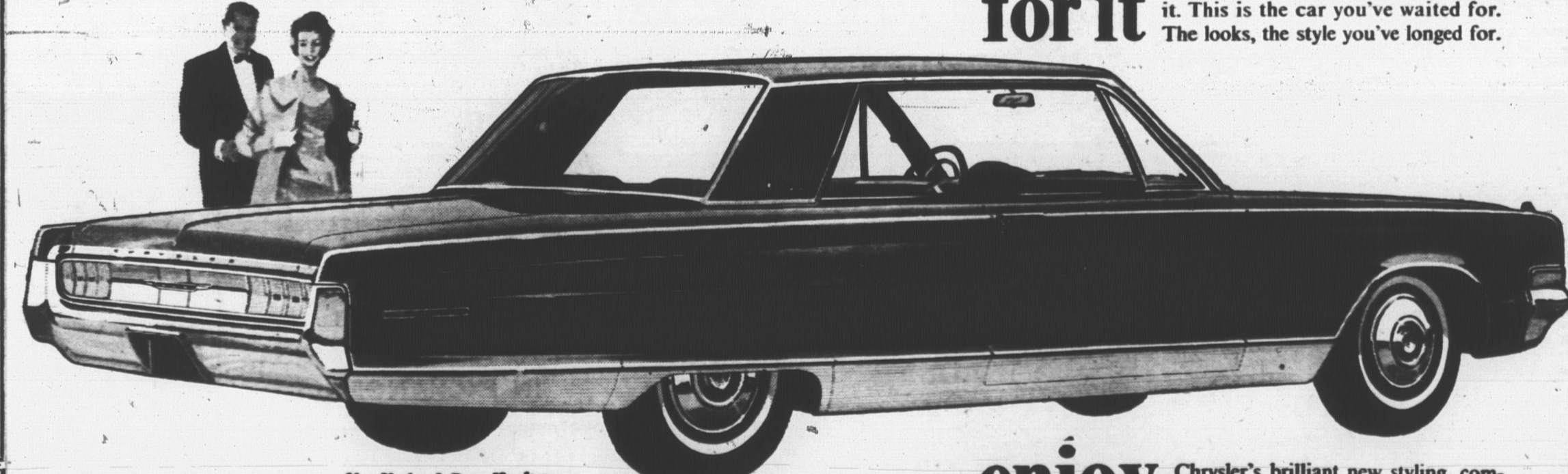

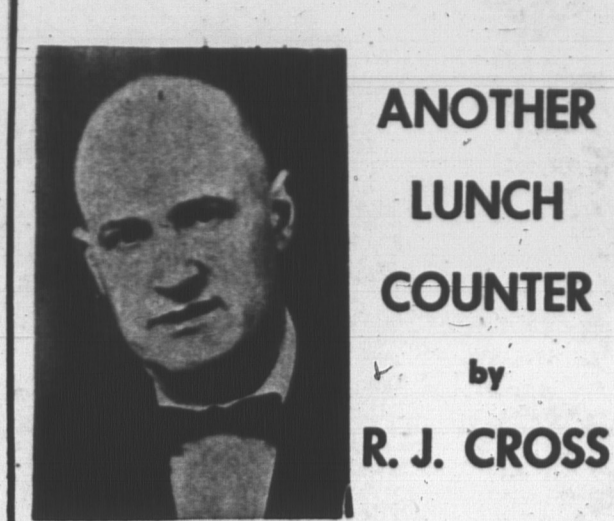
