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93,000 Homes Started Last Year

OTTAWA, April 24 (CP) — Construction of some 93,000 houses was started in Canada last year, Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation said today in a quarterly review of the country's housing situation. Although the number of houses started during 1949 was some 2,000 less than the 95,000 started in 1948, C.M.H.C. reported that a total of 35,000 homes built with Federal Government assistance last year represented an increase of 20 per cent over the year before. The number of houses completed in 1949 was 91,000—almost 10,000 more than the previous year.

Naval Appointments

OTTAWA, April 24 — (CP) — Appointment of Cmdr. James S. Davis, 42, of Oakville, Ont., as senior officer of the west coast reserve fleet, was announced by naval headquarters today. Cmdr. Davis succeeds Cmdr. Harry Kingsley, 49, of Victoria, who is going on retirement leave following 34 years' service in the Royal Canadian Navy. Cmdr. Kingsley will retire on pension in November. Under his new appointment, Cmdr. Davis becomes commanding officer of the Canadian mine-sweeper Rockcliffe, now being used as a depot ship for the reserve fleet at Esquimalt. He also is senior officer reserve fleet, West Coast, commander of the dockyard and King's harbor master at Esquimalt.

Sees ACWW Big Factor In Hope for World Peace

James TORONTO April 24, Canada has made a great gift to the world in the Women's Institute, born in Ontario 53 years ago and grown internationally, through the Associated Country Women of the World, until it is now operative in 30 countries with 5,600,000 members, said Mrs. E. E. Morton, Vegreville Alta., national president. And it might be that the ACWW, pressing for such things as the raising of standard of living, rehabilitation of family life, better distribution of food may prove the greatest hope for world peace, she said. Through the ACWW the Federated Women's Institute of Canada has representation on several conferences of the United Nations, she said. "We believe if we can live the terms of the declaration of human rights we have gone a long way in bringing about the brotherhood of man," she said. Mrs. Morton was in Toronto for a few hours en route to Ottawa for an executive conference at which representatives from the provinces discussed the ACWW meeting in Copenhagen Sept. 9-18. She will also plan for entertainment of the international body should they accept Canada's invitation to meet here in 1953. About 53 women from Canada, representing all the provinces, will go to the Copenhagen meeting, at which delegates from 46 countries will be present. It is to be a good-will tour, and as many contacts as possible will be made with women's organizations in various countries explained Mrs. Morton. Canadian delegates will leave here Aug. 18. The Canadians will spend some time in England and Scotland, visiting in homes of WI members and telling the people there of the Canadian work. They will also visit several cities on the Continent. "Your Miss Lewis has done a wonderful job in planning the tour, and we are glad she is coming with us," said the national president with reference to the director of Ontario W. I., Anna P. Lewis. While in Ottawa this week Mrs. Morton will also present a brief to the Massey Commission outlining the work of the Canadian WI, now 100,000 strong, in building up the rural life of the country. Among recommendations in the brief is included a national art gallery and national museum. A national library where public archives and records could be preserved is cited as another need. The FWIC would also like some further assistance to rural libraries. More films depicting life and industry in Canada, with simple lists of available films would also be valuable, the country women think. One of the latest WI cultural projects is the Canadian Mosaic, a follow up to the very successful Tweedsmuir Village Histories, staged the national president. Institutes are currently compiling examples and histories of handicrafts, including those brought to Canada from other countries, she said.
