Good skating on Government Pond.

 The brig *Eliza*, which went ashore at Red Head, is a total loss.  
 AN agreement has been reached between Germany and the Vatican.  
 A LARGE train of cattle for England passed through Moncton Thursday.  
 A VEIN of copper four miles long, has been discovered in St. John County, N. B.  
 AN attempt was made on the 18th inst. to assassinate the Crown Prince of Sweden.  
 Two suicides are reported from Ontario—one at Hamilton, and the other at Brantford.  
 A MEETING of St. Joseph's Total Abstinence Society will be held at St. Patrick's Hall, at 7 o'clock, to-morrow evening.

 A CLIPPER.—The barque "M. J. Foley" arrived at this port yesterday. Her passage from London to Halifax is said to be the fastest on record.  
 The Halifax "Herald" reports a terrible boating accident at Advocate Harbor, Cumberland County. Six persons are supposed to be drowned.  
 The Captain and crew of the brig *Fleetwood*, wrecked at Barbadoes reefs recently, arrived here last night. A portion of the brig's cargo was saved, and sold on the 5th inst.  
 A SAD case of accidental poisoning is reported from Windsor, Ont. A Miss Duck, an inmate of a convent, was accidentally given a dose of laudanum instead of a tablespoonful of brandy. She died almost immediately.

 GOLD ON THE LAKE OF THE WOODS.—A letter from Ras Portage, Canada Pacific Railway, Nov. 8, to a gentleman in this city, says: "There is great excitement here over the find of gold on the Lake of the Woods. Prospecting parties are out in large numbers."  
 A GREAT disaster occurred on Lake Ontario on the 18th inst. A fleet of six tugs, three dredges, two derricks and seven scows were lost during a heavy gale and snowstorm. Nineteen persons were rescued and eighteen are supposed to be drowned.  
 The Halifax "Chronicle" says:—"A tall man with a tall hat, was an object of interest in this city a few months ago, and a similarly described individual is distinguishing himself by chasing females on the street in Charlottetown, P. E. I." The "tall man" has not molested any one since THE EXAMINER called attention to his dark deeds.

 THE Halifax "Reporter and Times" reports that a sensation has been caused in a beautiful rural district of Nova Scotia over an alleged forgery case. A respectable woman (married), is charged with having forged a note with the knowledge and consent of her husband, and of trying to collect the same. The parties have been arrested. No names are given.  
 At Queloc, on the morning of Nov. 17, a boy, the son of J. B. Emund, baker, while playing on St. Andrew's street, saw the North Shore train approaching at its usual slow speed which is maintained while passing through the city. The boy tried to jump on the cars with the view of taking a ride, a practice indulged in by many, when missing his footing he fell under the wheels, and was instantly killed, his head and foot being severed from his body.
