ABDUL HAMID'S SILVER JUBILEE

Enjoyment of Festivities Spoiled

BY THE DISCOVERY OF A PLOT AGAINST HIS LIFE

Over a Hundred Arrests Said to Have Been Made.

CONSTANTINOPLE, September 7.—Abdul Hamid's enjoyment of the jubilee festivities, which began Sunday on the completion of his 25th year as head of the Ottoman Empire, has been spoiled by the discovery of a plot against his life.

One hundred and eighteen arrests, including several high officials, have been made.

He gloried in the British flag that has stood nobly for liberty of conscience and braved the battles of a thousand years in its onward march of light and liberty. He urged the members of the order to live up to the constitution, which he had studied, as it was for an open Bible, temperance, and righteousness, and impressed on all the great importance of the family altar. Deacon Holmes closed the service with an earnest prayer for the members of the society and all present.

GERMANY REFUSES TO WITHDRAW

From the Capital of China

THE BRITISH REPLY NOT YET FORMULATED.

Expected That Allies Will Agree Upon a Common Policy.

LONDON, Sept. 7.—Germany's polite refusal to withdraw from Peking is commented upon with keen satisfaction in London, and the hope is expressed that Lord Salisbury will show similar firmness.

The British reply has not yet been formulated. Lord Salisbury desires to consult with his colleagues and has notified the Foreign Office of his intention to return to London from the continent early next week.

There is little doubt however that Germany's reply is the outcome of the discussion carried on during the last few days between the European cabinets, and that a compromise policy of maintaining the occupation of the capital but withdrawing the greater part of the troops from Tien Tsin will be found to have met with general concurrence.

From Shanghai it is reported that Japan has notified the Powers of her willingness to withdraw her troops provided an adequate garrison is left for the legations and on condition that China formally requests the evacuation of and opens genuine negotiations for peace.

Altogether appearances are more than hopeful, and it is likely that when Count Van Waldersee arrives a fortnight hence at Taku he will find the allies agreed upon some common policy.

BERLIN, Sept. 7.—The German Vice Admiral at Taku telegraphs that Capt. Pohl in his report from Peking says the impression he formed on marching through the Imperial Palace reception halls and rooms on August 28th, was "Dirt and neglect." "No treasures," he adds, "were observed."

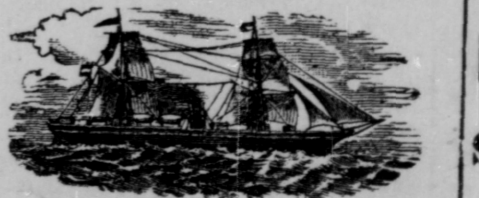
