SITUATION AT SANTIAGO.

General Shafter Tells of the Difficulties of the Position.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—The War Department has made public the following despatch received from General Shafter, in response to a query by the Department as to ships being turned away from Santiago. Press reports not true. I only know of three ships having arrived, one from Kingston and the others from the United States. The Bratton has sold its cargo; the other, a ship from New Orleans, has sold part of it and tells me it is going away tonight. I think he will sell before he leaves. The trouble is they did not expect to pay any duty and arrived here without money. The Spanish customs as applied to Spanish subjects, has only been collected and the 20 cents per ton, as ordered by the secretary. I have discovered this morning an attempt on the part of the municipal authorities to collect a local tax of 40 cents per one hundred kilos, in this instance, amounting to twenty-five hundred dollars. I had already settled this matter by ordering its non-collection. The fact is there is no money here to do business and merchants are very timid about making purchases, fearing the effect of the Red Cross supplies, who really are feeding the town. The New Orleans man, for instance, brought 29 head of cattle which he sold at \$5 per head. The person buying kills one a day, selling the meat at seventy cents a pound. Of course only a few people buy. The first week we were here people were starving to death and I think a few now are suffering from the effects of starvation. I am positive, however, that the customs is honestly administered. (Signed) SHAFTER, Major-General.

UNCLE SAM'S QUEER ALLIES.

(Mail and Empire.) Uncle Sam is beginning to find out that his allies, the Cuban insurgents, are not such patterns of propriety after all. A few months ago these gentlemen figured as patriots, seeking to emancipate their native land from Spanish oppression. A nearer view tends to remove the patriotic colouring and to picture the insurgents as men who went to get rid of one form of misrule in order to establish another. The insurgents are relatively to the entire population of Cuba a small body of people. Living in the hilly districts, following no regular occupation, they have subsisted by fighting, and it is to be feared in a considerable degree by plunder. Of course, it was the duty of Spain to put an end to their operations, and to guarantee the security of property, much of which in Cuba is American. The troops before Santiago have made a close examination of the patriots. They find that these men have strange habits, and for the nineteenth century, equally strange principles. The first eccentricity that developed itself was an inordinate appetite and a desire to be fed by the rescuing party. The United States has had to assume the duty of supporting the allies. Then the insurgents exhibited an indignant position to work. They did little if any fighting in the open. As a matter of fact, they have cultivated the guerilla system of warfare. The United States troops therefore had to tear the front of the battle. If the Cuban would not, or could not, fight for Cuba Libre, it was supposed that possibly they would work. But to labour in and around the camps, they were altogether the worse. They were quite ready, however to blunder and to kill. Much annoyed were they, after the United States had taken Santiago to find, first, that their right to elect a President to govern the city and province was not recognized by the United States general in command; secondly, that they could not go in and sack the city; and thirdly, that there was not to be a shooting match with the Spanish soldiers as targets. It looked to them as if they were being unjustly deprived of the fruits of a victory which somebody else had won. Their latest eccentricity is their fight with and their defeat by the Spanish soldiers on their way to Santiago to surrender. Imagine the brave patriots being put to the run by troops that already acknowledged themselves vanquished. For this indignity they want vengeance, and it appears that the parties who are to suffer are not necessarily the soldiers, who obstinately refused to be killed, but other Spanish parties who are not guilty on that count of the indictment. The discovery of the laxity of the insurgents throws some light on the past and upon the future. Suppose Spain had yielded to the notice to quit the island, thus leaving inoffensive people without protection what would have happened? Again, can the United States as a civilized nation evacuate Cuba with the insurgents on top? It seems probable that the prediction that Uncle Sam will have to turn about and fight the insurgents after he gets through with Spain will come true. In fact, it would not be surprising if the Spanish residents were to ask for annexation to the United States as a defensive measure. This would destroy the purposes of the Cubans and would relieve the United States of the charge that it took the island, after having declared that its warfare had no such purpose in view.

KINLOCH NOTES.

Farmers in this section are busy hay making. The hay crop this year is somewhat heavier than usual. Potato bugs are not so numerous as formerly and many farmers will be saved the trouble of using Paris Green. 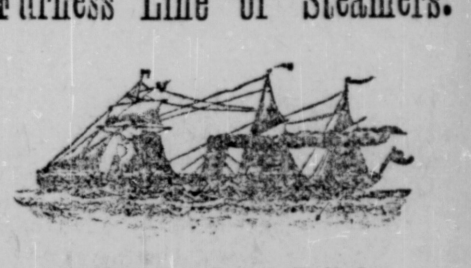

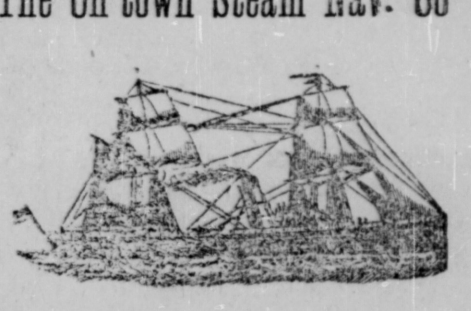
