### Tire Blowout Is Blamed For Accident At Lower Montague

MONTAGUE — Miss Mary Hewitt of Lower Montague is a patient in the Kings County Memorial Hospital, Montague, following an accident Sunday afternoon at Lower Montague when she was a passenger, and driven by Laurie MacDonald of Cambridge, went out of control, turning end over end, and coming to rest in a field. The accident occurred when the rear tire blew out.

Two other passengers, Miss Carol Yeo and Miss Devona Hewitt, both of Lower Montague, and the driver, were all treated for shock, bruises and cuts. The full extent of Miss Hewitt's injuries are as yet unknown.

## Huge Power Output Seen For Canada-Type A-Plant

GENEVA (CP) — A top Canadian nuclear scientist said today that a single Canadian-designed atomic power plant may one day generate up to 1,000,000 kilowatts of electric energy, equivalent to a large hydro-electric power station.

The statement was made by Dr. W. B. Lewis, vice-president of Atomic Energy of Canada Limited, the Crown company which operates Canada's Chalk River, Ont., nuclear project. Dr. Lewis heads the Canadian delegation to the second United Nations conference on peaceful uses of atomic energy. The two-week meeting began here Monday.

Dr. Lewis made the statement in describing work in Canada on the development of an atomic power plant using natural uranium as a fuel and heavy water as the agent to heat ordinary water to produce steam to drive turbines. The turbines in turn would drive electric generators.

**NO LIMIT TO SIZE**

Dr. Lewis said Canadian research shows there need be no limit to the size of this type of reactor.

"It may only need confidence founded on experience to generate 1,000,000 kilowatts from one reactor," he said.

Canada at present is building an experimental atomic power plant which will produce 20,000 kilowatts of electricity. Canadian engineers also are designing a station which will have an output of some 200,000 kilowatts.

A single nuclear reactor capable of producing up to 1,000,000 kilowatts of electricity would be vastly more powerful than thermal plants using coal, oil or gas. They generate an average of 200,000 kilowatts, with some producing up to 400,000 kilowatts.

There are several Canadian hydro-electric plants which generate more than 1,000,000 kilowatts.

**URANIUM SUPPLY HUGE**

Dr. Lewis said the supply of uranium in Canada is so great that it will make possible the construction of even the "most extravagant nuclear power projects."

Improved methods of producing heavy water would also mean an adequate supply of this material at low cost.

A paper read at the conference by S. W. Clarkson, economist with Atomic Energy of Canada, and Dr. J. Davis of the British Columbia Electric Company, forecast economic atomic power in Canada some time after 1965.
