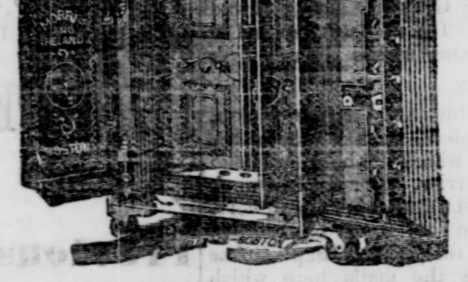

Curing a Cancer by a Hot Bath.

The Kansas City (Mo) Times narrates a remarkable case in which a cancer was removed, "root and branch," without pain, in fourteen days. The patient was a Mr. Chace, freight agent at Kansas City of the Hannibal and St. Joseph Railroad. About three weeks since, all other remedies having failed, he was placed in a Turkish bath for two hours each day for seven days, with a temperature of 170 deg. when it was found that the cancer was dropping out, root and fangs entire. It first became red on one side and then burst the skin. Mr. Chace applied, by advice, a poultice, which aided in drawing the cancer from the cheek. "A few mornings ago, says the Times, "the patient himself brought the cancer in a small vial to Prof. Kellogg, and it had fallen out clean, and with all its roots and fangs attached, leaving nothing except the ugly indentation in the face where the cancer had been. He will now continue to take the baths until the cheek is healed. The cancer as extracted is about the size of a hazel nut."

A Freak of Nature.

A strange freak of nature has just been discovered in Cleveland, Ohio. Fredk., Grandfather, a Swiss, resides at No. 535 St. Clair street with his wife and two children. Albertine, the youngest, two years old, has two tongues. The second tongue has grown from the root and on top of the first. The mother first noticed it when the child was three days old. The second tongue was then quite small, but now it is nearly as large as the real tongue. The anterior part of the upper tongue looks natural, but the posterior part is constricted and round, giving the unnatural growth of a pear shape. The child has never experienced any difficulty in swallowing its food or in breathing, looks natural in every other way, and has always been healthy. The family have been in America two and a half years, and in Cleveland three weeks.

Balloon Races.

Balloon races are about to be started in Paris. A "steepleschase de ballons" was announced for the 4th of January, the start to take place at some point within the fortifications, and the church-spire of one of the neighboring villages to be fixed upon as the winning post. Other experiments in ballooning are to take place in February. Great things are expected of an "aerial velocipede," just invented by an amateur. The motive power is supplied by wheels worked by pedals as in an ordinary bicycle or tricycle. M. Godard will make a trial trip about the same time with his new "aerial torpedo," a species of military balloon designed to accompany an army on a campaign. M. Godard says that with this balloon it will be possible for him to take his station over a besieged city and drop into it 2,000 pound weight of bombs.

A New Alphabet.

At a meeting of the California State Teacher's Association, A. L. Baneroff delivered a lecture on a proposed new alphabet. The Sacramento Union says: "Previous to the address charts were distributed showing the proposed San Francisco Alphabet for Revised English Spelling, 1884. This shows a scheme of thirty vowels, four diphthongs, and twenty-four consonants. The system may be summed up practically in the statement that it is "shorthand" written in a long way. The characters, apart from the ordinary alphabet, resemble ordinary letters now in use generally. A variety of advantages are claimed for the new chart.

Remedy for Wakefulness.

When nervous wakefulness ensues at night time, when there is a desire to sleep, but, on account of a peculiar state of mind and body, rest will not come, inhalation of pure air is a safe and efficient soporific. It is observed in these conditions that a person only breathes half-way, and that the oxygen in the lungs is kept exhausted. A physician recommends a few full respirations as the best remedy for this kind of wakefulness, which is produced frequently by the condition of the atmosphere as well as state of the mind.

An Invisible Studio.

It is said that the bank of France has an invisible studio in a gallery behind the cashiers, so that a signal from one of them any suspected customer will instantly have his picture taken without his own knowledge. The camera has also become very useful in the detection of frauds, a word or figure that to the eye seemed completely erased being clearly reproduced in photographs of the document that had been tampered with.

A Victim.

The North Sydney Herald of the 7th inst., says: On Tuesday morning the body of a man was found floating near the steamboat wharf, in Baddeck, and proved to be that of Hector McKenzie. The drowned man was last seen on Christmas eve, when he was observed to be the worse of liquor. He belonged to Baddeck, and leaves a large family.
