Among The Farmers

Federation Of Agriculture News

1953-1954

Farm people will look back on 1953 with mixed feelings and as usual look forward to the new year perhaps not with optimism but at least with hope. Farming has always been full of promises that have been realized but nevertheless farm people, a tenacious class, are not easily discouraged and keep looking to the future with a strong determination to improve their position and to correct the mistakes of the past. Soft Spots. Federal politicians keep telling that Canada's economy is in a buoyant condition and prospects are good for 1954, although some soft spots are appearing notably agriculture, textiles, and farm machinery. In some branches of Agriculture, the softening up process has reached a point where "soft" is hardly the descriptive adjective, the foundation has completely disappeared. In this Province purchasing power has been drastically reduced by low returns for potatoes and cattle, many of our business firms are in a good position to appreciate this fact. Turnip Marketing A number of small meetings have been held by commercial turnip producers and shippers during the past weeks and last Monday night representatives came together from different areas to plan for a general meeting of the industry during the month of February. Discussion centered around the key problems of improving quality and a more orderly movement to market. Plans were made to have a Federation representative, while attending the C. F. A. meeting in London, Ont., visit the turnip growing areas of Ontario with a view to acquiring information on grading and marketing practices and the type of warehouse used for sizing and waxing. There has been a gradual decline in the volume of turnips moved from this Province and the belief is general that this is due at least in part to lack of attention to quality and indifferent handling methods. The flavour of Island turnips is excellent and with a more efficient approach to packing and selling coupled with judicious advertising it would appear possible to expand the market. This Little Pig. It may perhaps be in order to briefly review at this time the 1952 hog story. At the close of 1952 hog prices were at the Government floor of \$26.00, previous announcement that the floor was to be lowered on January 1, to \$23.00 brought a flood of pigs, big and little including breeding stock, to market during December. During the first week in January the price actually did fall to \$23 then started to climb to \$30 by May and has ranged from that figure to \$37.50 in the meantime. Coupled with improved prices there came a slight decline in feed costs and those who stayed in the business reaped the benefits of their wisdom, and persistency. Hog marketing prospects look fair for the coming year. Market volume in hogging likely not increase before next fall. Should American prices remain at reasonable levels Canada may expect a similar situation. None of the rosy tinges apparent on the hog countenance. Prices Cattle Business. The cattle picture in 1953 had were down at the beginning of the year and continued to fall as the year progressed. Prospects for any substantial increase in 1954 are not good due to the large cattle population in both Canada and the United States. One encouraging feature is the increased consumption brought about by lower prices and the related result that storage stocks are not unduly high. Calf prices were not a great deal lower in 1953 and there would appear to have been more profit in a well finished calf than in a light unfinished yearling. In short, a well finished calf will return more real money than the same animal in an unfinished condition a year later. Potato Settlements. Between October 13 and December 20, the Potato Board selling agency has handled over 3,000 tons of bushels of potatoes and of this amount the farmer has been settled for substantially over 2,000,000 bushels or just about 20 per cent. It would appear that not all the delay in the farmer receiving his settlement has been due to the agencies inability to handle the heavy load. In some cases cheques have taken longer than necessary in getting from the dealers hands to the farmer. This is something that the grower can check on by comparing the date on the cheque with the date on which he receives it. From the standpoint of volume moved this province has certainly enjoyed a preferred position and will quite likely fill the entire American quota for tablestock. The railway wharf in Charlottetown has been a scene of great activity with as many as three potato boats either loading or waiting to load. Due to the large volume moved this fall prospects would appear reasonably good for the movement of the entire crop. Farm Forum. Farm Forum groups will hold their first meeting of the New Year on January 4 and discuss the Topic "What Is The Ideal Farm Organization." Much of the discussion will center around the methods used to finance these groups and groups will be asked to submit their opinions on the bothersome problems of obtaining sufficient funds to do an effective job. On January 11, the all-important question of what farmers can do to protect themselves against falling prices in the face of rising costs will receive the attention of farm forum members. This is a problem of some urgency and one which must be solved if many farmers are to keep their heads afloat. A reasonable distance about the water line. Thoughts For Our Time

OF HUMAN MORTALITY

There are, in our life, at least two constant reminders of our death. The first is sleep. Every night when we go to rest our consciousness blanks out and we are in a new kind of existence. And before retiring, we pray God to forgive us our sins and protect us during the night. The second reminder of death is winter. We see each spring return to new life of the trees and other perennials, and the sprouting of apparently lifeless seeds. These miracles of nature about to us in their own silent way and we too feel new vitality. But after the harvest the flowers fade, and the leaves fall and winter comes on. Nor can we be unaffected by this universal message of the transitoriness of the creatures of earth, and we realize that we too one day must pass from this life. When morning comes, we forget about the night. When winter comes we say "Can spring be far behind?" When a year ends we speak only of the New Year. But the future may never be. The past at least has really happened. Just as each night we should examine the previous day so each new year we should examine the previous year. What does God think of it? Will another year be any good to me if I spend it the way I spent the last one? There is a weakness in every comparison. When we compare our death to sleep or to winter there is a truth brought out: all of these things are sure to come. But there is a danger that we might be misled into imagining that after death we enter a trance-like state, as when we sleep or when animals hibernate. This would be completely false. After death there is no sleep whatsoever. And so it is better to compare our death to that of a seed, which ceases to be a seed, but becomes something more. After death those who are friends of God will enter Heaven and there will see that "eternal life" is really life, and that our life here on earth is rather like a sleep. Those who are enemies of God will enter immediately into "eternal death" and then will fully realize that the death of the body is a small thing compared to the death of the soul. A New Year is beginning. An Old Year is ending. And this takes place at the time of the birth of the God-Man. Is there a message in this coincidence? Can I not see that if I live the coming year in a God-like manner I shall live the life of God in Heaven, should death come to me in 1954? And what is a God-like life? It would be difficult to say how a man could live like God, had not God become man to show us "I am the Way, and the Truth, and the Life." No one can be unaffected by the thought of death, the endless joy of heaven, and the unending torments of hell. But the so-called "pleasures" of life are so enticing in prospect that many go astray. The end of a year is a good time to begin anew. All things on earth pass away. We must use them so as to gain with them eternal goods. As Shakespeare said: "What win I, if I gain the thing I seek? A dream, a breath, a froth of fleeting joy. Who buys a minute's mirth to wait a week? Or sells eternally to get a toy? For one sweet grape who will the vine destroy? Or what fond beggar, but to touch the crown, Would, with the sceptre, straight be stricken down?" Yet we see many begin the New Year unmindful that our life is only a testing ground, unheeded of St. Peter's admonition: "Be sober and watch, for your adversary the devil goes about as a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour." They are like the farmer in the Gospel whose only thought during the overflowing harvest was for the bigger barns he would build the next year. And it was said to him: "Thou fool, this night do they require thy soul of thee." We hear frequently these days the phrase "Merry Christmas, and a Happy New Year." It is only by taking to heart the message and example of Christ that our New Year can be made happy.

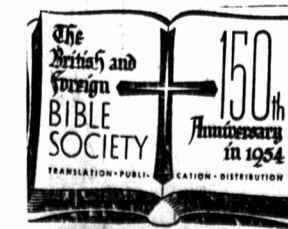
