THE Watchlight Service ending in a church at Rosling, Pa., is related in a despatch of the 1st instant. It says: - "While watchlight services were being held in the Reformed Evangelical Church last night a large cannon filled with stones and powder was discharged. The front wall was stove in, and nearly all the windows shattered. There was great excitement among the audience, but no one was hurt. There were eighty arrests."

AT Silburn, near London, a fortnight ago, two novel censures were taken, and with curiously similar results. One was a census of the number of persons attending the twenty-five churches on a certain evening between the hours of six and eight, and the other a census of the number attending the thirty-five public-houses on the same evening between the same hours. In one case the number was 5,570 in the other 5,591.

A CONFESION to three murders was made by the wife of Jay Stetwell, of the Burlington and Quincy Railway, Mount Vernon O. She was on her death bed at the time. The first murder was that of Benjamin Swegert, her husband, who she killed in Maryville, Mo. in 1877, with the aid of her mother and brother. The second was a stranger whom she killed for his money, while stopping at a boarding-house. The third was her daughter, aged 14, whom she strangled in the presence of her mother at Rulo, Neb., in 1880. She also confessed to attempting to kill her present husband three times to obtain his life insurance. The woman dying of consumption.

THE English House of Commons is to be treated at the opening of the next session to another dose of the Bradlaugh nuisance. He asks for no more petitions, but for a national demonstration in Hyde Park on the day on which Parliament meets. He has promised his friends in London to bring about 30,000 men from the country by special trains, and hopes they will be met by ten times that number. Whether, following the Chartist plan, these 300,000 are to march on Westminster, Mr. Bradlaugh has not yet decided, but he is determined to take his seat without any further formality about taking the oath or making an affirmation.

Gambetta's Funeral. PARIS, Jan. 8. The funeral of M. Gambetta took place here on Saturday. Over thirty thousand people were in the procession, including the Freemasons (in uniform), Advocates, Students, Ministers, Senators, Deputies, and the English delegation from Boulogne. Speeches at the grave were made by M. Chanfor, M. Falateuf, and M. Deveres, Minister of Justice.

Ireland's Independence. DUBLIN, Jan. 8. Mr. Sexton, in a speech at Sligo, on Saturday last, declared that the future policy of the Irish Party was to agitate for the Independence of Ireland.

The Congo Difficulty. LONDON, Jan. 8. England will, in exchange for the cession of Wydah, on the west coast of Africa, support Portugal's claims on the Congo River, Africa.

Meeting at Corran Ban Bridge. An influential meeting of the electors of Lot 34 and 35, was held at Corran Ban Bridge, on the 6th inst., to promote the construction of a Breakwater at Tracadie harbor. Philip Hughes, Esq., in the chair and the undersigned secretary. Messrs. Peter Campbell, John Angus McDonald, and Michael Ready, made explanations regarding the two petitions previously presented to the Dominion Government on the subject of this Breakwater, and showed most conclusively the great loss to the shipping interest in consequence of the recent serious decrease in the depth of the channel. Only a few years since vessels of regular or considerable tonnage regularly entered the harbor with perfect safety; and at the time of the American storm no less than 90 American fishing schooners took shelter in this place. Dr. Jenkins and the Hon. D. Ferguson addressed the meeting, strongly supporting the object, and volunteered their assistance in the advocacy of this greatly needed harbor improvement.

The meeting unanimously resolved to put forth renewed efforts to induce the Dominion Government to undertake the work without delay, and a committee, consisting of Messrs. Michael Ready, Peter Campbell and William Ellis, was appointed to draft another petition to the Dominion Government, obtain signatures thereto, and place it in the hands of our representatives.

A letter from Mr. Brecken was read, apologizing for his inability to attend, explaining the steps already taken by him, and assuring the meeting of his determination to urge the work to a successful result.

The meeting then closed by tendering its thanks to Dr. Jenkins and Mr. Ferguson for their attendance.

CIVIC ELECTION BY THE MAYOR. IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the Eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intitled 'An Act to Incorporate the town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same.' I do hereby give Public Notice that an Election of a Mayor and One Person to Serve as a Common Councilman in the City Council for each Ward of said City. Being in all a MAYOR and FIVE COMMON COUNCILMEN, will be held on WEDNESDAY, the 24th Day of January, A. D. 1883. At the several places, that is to say: In Ward No. 1, at or near the Store of Messrs. J. & T. Morris, corner of Queen and Water Streets. In Ward No. 2, at or near the house of Mr. Thomas Connolly, opposite Mr. R. Heartz's Warehouse, Sydney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets. In Ward No. 3, at or near the Market House. In Ward No. 4, at or near the Fire Engine House, fronting on Kent Street, east, between Weymouth and Cumberland Streets. In Ward No. 5, at or near the House of Widow Tierney, corner of Euston and Great George Streets. And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day. DESCRIPTION OF WARDS. Number One shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Dorchester Street, and the parcel of land formerly known as the Military Barrack Ground. Number Two shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Richmond Street and north of Dorchester Street. Number Three shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Grafton Street and north of Richmond Street. Number Four shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Fitzroy and north of Grafton Streets. Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies north of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town. NOMINATION DAY. Act 43, Victoria, Cap. 15 - Seven Days before the time of any and every election for Mayor or Councilors, the Person or Candidates for the office of Mayor or Councilor shall give their names in as such Candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences and additions of such persons, together with the office and wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination for such candidates. There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councilor, a fee of five dollars, which sums shall go toward paying the cost of the election. No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councilor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid. The time appointed for the nomination of candidates, shall be from the time of twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose.
