**Tito Welcomed In Romania**

BUCHAREST (AP)—President Tito of Yugoslavia, beaming triumphantly on his arrival from Moscow was welcomed by Romania's Communist leaders Sunday as a "dear and beloved comrade."

Tito responded with an offer to let bygone be bygones and remain on good-neighbor terms in the future—on the basis of the agreements he signed in Moscow with the Kremlin's leaders.

Romania's Red leadership turned out 250,000 people in this city of about 1,500,000 to welcome Tito and cheer him as he was driven through the city in a Russian car.

The motorcade went down the same street which four years ago was plastered with posters depicting Tito as a hangman and a bloody-handed tool of the Americans. Bucharest was the headquarters of the Cominform—the

group of Soviet-led Communist states which ousted Tito out in 1948. It no longer exists.

THREE KILLED IN SMASH . . . WHITECOURT, Alta. (CP)—A man, a woman and her three-year-old daughter were killed Friday when a car in which they were travelling struck the rear of an oil truck 30 miles west of this town, 100 miles northwest of Edmonton.

Six DROWN . . . PRICE, Utah (AP)—A boat loaded with a family of eight on a fishing trip capsized on Scott's field reservoir Saturday and six persons, including three children, were drowned. The dead were John Kanakis, 30, his wife and three children under 10, and a brother.

STRUCK BY CURTAIN . . . LONDON (Reuters)—Violetta Elvin, Sadler's Wells ballerina, was shaken up Saturday night as she stooped to pick up one of the many roses thrown onto the stage from the audience after her farewell appearance. She was struck by the curtain as it was lowered.

**N. S. Man Drowns While Fishing**

KENTVILLE, N.S. (CP)—Dennis S. Eaton, 66, of nearby Greenwich drowned Sunday when he "blacked out" while fishing in a canoe. His wife who was with him was rescued.
