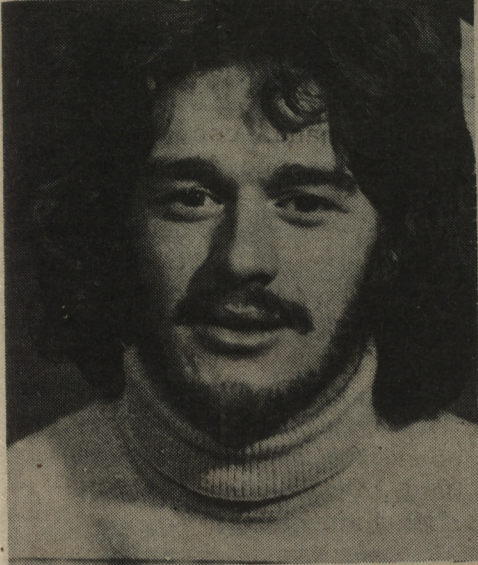


Candidates In The Upcoming Student Elections PRESIDENT By Acclamation

Though 'Woozy' will become president of the Student Union by acclamation, we feel that it is worthwhile to print his campaign promises. Although he won't be voted

into office, he will still be responsible to the Student body.

Woozy says that in the past students have put into office someone who they feel is a politician; someone who thinks they have been delegated to do the work for the students. He feels that if someone got elected who knows students, that person, in turn, can ask advice, support and be supported by students and therefore can be more effective. He says also that students involvement will only occur on "a one to one basis - individually, students have an input to make, that they can contribute but they have never been asked to do so.

The Cadre asked for an opinion on a Student Bill of Rights:

Woozy replied saying that "in a university with a student population of 1,400 it should be realized that financially we (students) are powerful. Sure we pay for one fifth of our education but the government is not going to pay four fifths for anything else but a student. The university is not here to provide jobs."

We also asked about the present Tenure system at UPEI.

Woozy said that in the aims and objectives meeting last week, those who were there, agreed that the system of tenure should be reviewed and if possible changed. He says there should be more student representation; something along the line of five profs to four students as a minimum or compromise.

On the question of the

physical plant of the Student Union which means the physical disunity of S.U. facilities (those in Main, Memorial and the Barn.) Woozy believes that "it is ridiculous that the administration will spend one million dollars in order to enlarge the existing administration offices and to create space for the Business Department." He suggested moving the Business department into the New Library because no one is using the classrooms as the professors are getting out of there as soon as they can find other classroom space. If this is the case, he sees no reason why the SU could not move all their offices (Executives, the Cadre, CIMN, photo club, year-book and SU pub.) into one building which is centrally located.

Ted—No Longer A Presidential Candidate

Ted Crockett, the present comptroller of the UPEI SU, has dropped out of the race for the office of president.

He is not running because he feels another candidate running for another position has initiated a smear campaign against him and Ted is dropping

out because he does not want to retaliate. These tactics, Ted described as "not being above board" and hopes that "the students will support the candidate who is running a fair campaign."

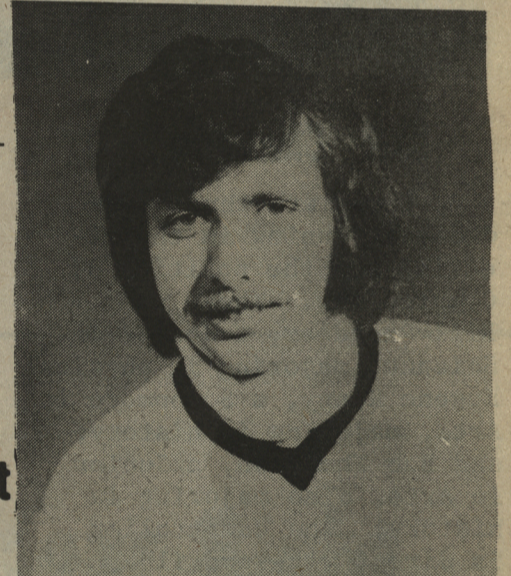
Ted stressed that "the presidential candidate, running

against him is not involved."

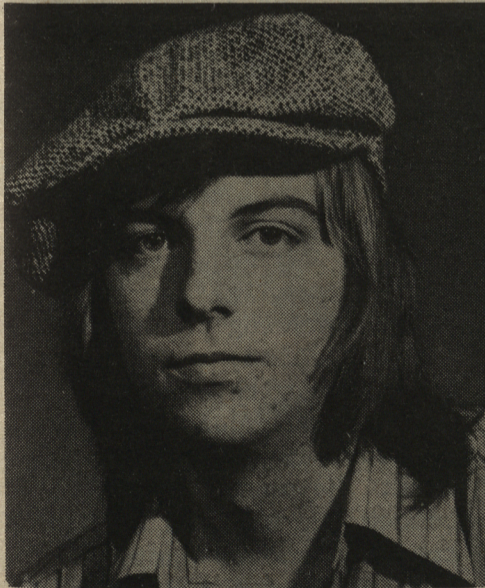
He does not regret this decision because he feels that the voting would have been anti-Ted and not pro-Woozy.

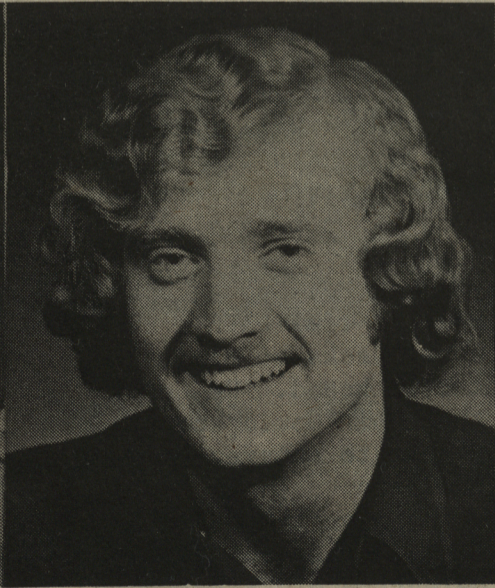
VICE-PRESIDENT



Charlie MacKenzie

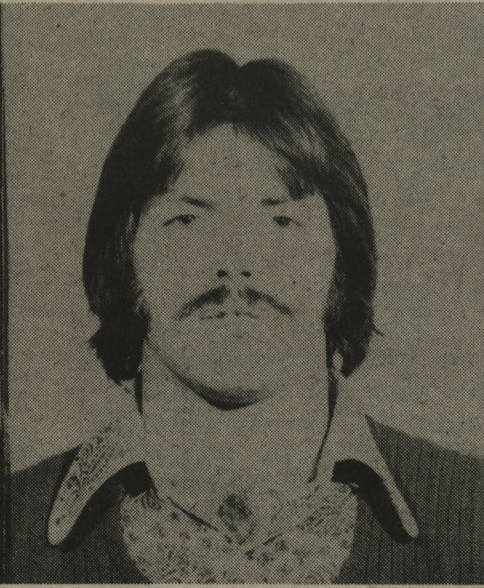
The position of vice-president is being contested by three students. These are Charlie MacKenzie, Gordon Coffin, and Tom Hayward.
