Marvin Edmund Hackett, Tigrish, pleaded not guilty to having care and control of a vehicle while impaired and the case was adjourned to Oct. 23.

### Industrial Areas Are Discussed

**SUMMERSIDE** — With the old airport property in mind the industrial committee of the Summerside rural planning commission, met Tuesday night in the town hall with the commission's central committee.  
The meeting was held to discuss suggestions regarding industrial areas in Summerside, St. Eleanor's and Sherbrooke.  
It was felt the first consideration for these designated areas should be the paving and providing of services. The committee suggested that an area of some 100 acres first be surveyed and that the owners of the land be contacted to see whether they would be willing to enter into agreement in the form of an option on the land until the rural commission presents a brief to the Atlantic Development Board for their consideration.  
The industrial committee meets again this evening to study proposed plans of the area concerned to get an idea how much of these areas could be designated as industrial areas.  
Tuesday night's meet was chaired by Mayor J. Ernest Morrison.

### City Souvenirs Are Discussed

Souvenirs were high on the agenda at Tuesday night's meeting at City Hall of the city's public relations committee, as Charlottetown's participation in the 1864 centennial celebration was discussed. Mayor A. Walfen Gaudet presided.  
The committee was particularly concerned with ideas for the types of souvenirs which will be presented to visiting dignitaries and chairmen of the various conventions which will be held here throughout the year.  
All decisions reached will be presented to City Council for approval at the October meeting and it is hoped to have all arrangements completed before the Jan. 1 opening.

### Workshops Open Today

At the physical education workshops scheduled to open in Summerside today and Charlottetown tomorrow, a total of some 200 teachers are expected to attend.  
Physical Education Director David M. Boswell said yesterday registrations have been coming in rapidly and it is likely some 75 will attend the sessions in Summerside and 125 in Charlottetown.  
Summerside High School will be the site of today's workshop and the Charlottetown workshop will be held at Prince of Wales College. Each session starts at 9:30 a.m. with registration and introductory remarks by Mr. Boswell.

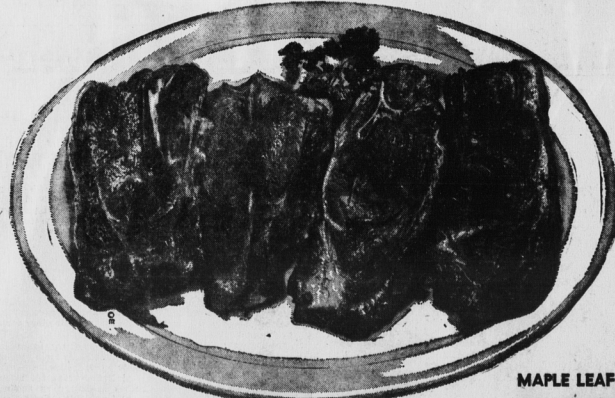
