Bloomfield, Brae And West Devon Church Meet

The annual Congregational meeting of the O'Leary, Bloomfield, Brae, and West Devon Churches was held on Monday night January 10th with Rev. Mr. Forsythe, Moderator, presiding and with a good attendance of members of the congregation.

After worship had been conducted the minutes of the last annual meeting were read and adopted. Mr. Thurber gave a report of session as follows: 30 New members were added to the roll, 13 by profession of faith, 17 by certificate and 67 were admitted to church by the sacrament of Baptism. There were 14 deaths and four weddings.

Satisfactory reports were given by the different organizations of the churches. Money raised was listed as follows: Evening Auxiliary \$194.00, Afternoon Auxiliary, \$176.75; Mission Circle, \$91.33; Mission Band, \$42.60; Baby Band, \$22.50; Affiliated Groups, \$5.00 making a total of \$532.18, an increase of \$29.18 over last year. The C. G. I. T. raised \$130.02 and the expenditures were \$71.46, leaving a balance of \$58.56.

Mrs. E. W. Turner, treasurer, reported the amounts raised by the different congregations: O'Leary, \$1,821.88; Bloomfield, \$97.66; Brae, \$375.62; West Devon, \$401.44, making a total of \$3,766.60. After some discussion it was decided to raise the evaluation of the Manse to \$7,500 and it was also decided to appoint a Manse Committee, to look after the essentials for the coming year, which is as follows: Mrs. Errol Stetson, Mrs. Reg MacAusland, Mrs. Bruce MacDougall, Mrs. Dan Ramsay, Mrs. Fred MacLeod, Mrs. Robert Oulgan, Mrs. Charles Moreshead and Mrs. Eric MacNeill. Mrs. E. W. Turner was re-elected Central Treasurer, for the coming year.

A committee to assist with the Missionary and Maintenance was

also appointed as follows: Mrs. Ivey MacFadyen, Mrs. Herbie Vacher, Mrs. Eric MacNeill, and Mrs. Alban Craswell. Mr. Bruce MacDougall resigned from the office of recording steward and was replaced by Mr. Reginald MacAusland. A vote of thanks was extended Mrs. E. W. Turner, and Mr. Bruce MacDougall for their faithful work, during the past year.

The new salary scale for ministers was adopted. Representatives appointed to attend the conference and Presbytery are Mr. John Moreshead and Mr. Lester Proffitt. The meeting closed with prayer by Mr. Thurber. —AZ.
