Clippings From Late Papers.

Tesayson will winter in London.

The great wealth of the late Cardinal
Pecca will go to the first one of his
relatives who adopts the clerical pro-
fession.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, who
is seventy years of age, lost his wife
two years ago, and his admirers who
are almost innumerable, are grieved by
the report that he is to marry again.

A letter which is a model for terse-
ness of expression is the following, from
the pen of the Italian poet Polston to a
friend: 'I had a grief and I have a
great joy—because you were sick and
because you have recovered!'

Baroness Lionel de Rothschild is ex-
ceedingly kind to penniless girls of the
Hebrew faith. She has educated several
who have made positions for themselves
in the musical world. Mlle. Isidor, who
has just appeared as "Lucia" in London,
has been educated by her.

Mrs. Baird, a native of Scotland, died
recently in Iowa at the age of one hun-
dred and eight years, having never had
a days illness, or had her eyesight af-
fected by old age. She was about the
house the day of her death. A sister
died a few years ago at the age of one
hundred and five.

The report comes from London that
many of the Liberals oppose the East-
ern policy of Mr. Gladstone, and that
so great is the hostility to it that he
may be forced to abandon measures
which are isolating England at a crit-
ical period in her history. It is further
reported that his party is divided, as
we predicted it would be, in relation to
the measures that should be adopted for
the suppression of the disturbances in
Ireland, one wing demanding that
more energetic measures be taken in-
stantly for the restoration of order in
the sister island, while the other strong-
ly denounces any policy of coercion.

The Prince of Wales is heavily in
debt. This is due to several causes. He
is "as generous as a prince." To his
tenants and servants he has always been
liberal, and the English people would
not have him otherwise. He loves to
patronize art, and he is benevolent to
the poor. But his heaviest expenditure
is in extending these hospitalities be-
cause of the frequent absence of the
queen-mother from London. The
Queen, it is now reported, has asked
Mr. Gladstone to suggest to Parliament
that it should pay off his most pressing
debts, and add ten thousand pounds a
year to his income. This the prime
minister is not likely to do, and it is re-
ported that he has intimated to the
Queen to pay these debts out of her
own enormous accumulations, and that
as the Prince expends large sums in
performing the duties of royalty, she
should give him a portion of the income
she enjoys as sovereign of the realm.
The publication of this report greatly
annoys the prince, and his friends say
that no such recommendation has been
made by Mr. Gladstone. If the minis-
ter wants to make himself more popu-
lar with the great mass of the English
people, he can secure that popularity
by securing from the Queen such a
transfer of a portion of her income as
will enable the prince to meet the ex-
penditures expected of him.

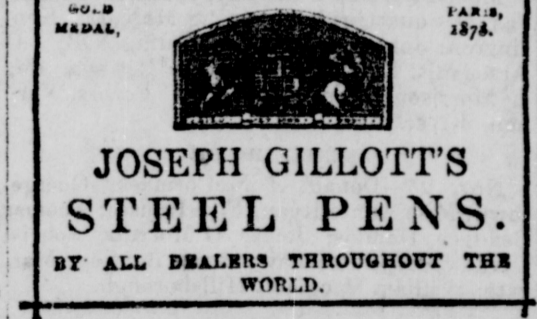
