

# Diefenbaker Lists Five Major Issues For Federal Election

OTTAWA (CP) — John Diefenbaker Wednesday night listed five "major" issues which he said are developing for the next federal election.

The Progressive Conservative member of Parliament for Prince Albert named them as:

1. "Restoration of the supremacy of Parliament."
2. Costs must be reduced if Canadian industry is to compete in world markets and taxation is a major contributing factor in production costs.
3. Agriculture is not receiving a fair share of the national income.
4. The Liberal government's "threat" of compulsory arbitration in labor disputes.
5. The "increasing domination" of Canadian industry and resources

by American interests.

Mr. Diefenbaker told the Progressive Conservative Business Women's Club that cabinet ministers must be made the servants rather than the masters of Parliament, "secure in their infallibility because of their servile majority."

A commission similar to the Hoover commission in the United States should attack seriously the problem of bringing about economic in government administration.

Mr. Diefenbaker said Prime Minister St. Laurent's speech Tuesday before the Canada Labor Congress "conveyed a threat" to labor's bargaining rights "which apparently is to be implemented by the dimly concealed mailed fist of the government."

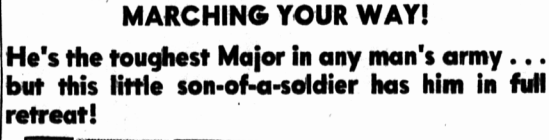
